NEW YORK, Oct. 10, (Reuter).—A leading Southern Rhodesian African nationalist said yesterday "bloody revolution" was the next stage in the country, where the situation was rapidly becoming "another Algeria."

Greece Willing To Join E.P.U.

BRUSSELS, Oct. 10, (DPA).—Greece is willing to join the proposed European Political Union as soon as it has been established, a delegation of the European Parliament which recently visited Greece reported yesterday.

According to the delegation's report members of the Greek Government have emphasized that Greek membership in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) rules out any form of military or political neutrality. Greece, associated with the Common Market for some time, should therefore become a member of the Political Union, too.

Members of the Greek Parliament, the report added, expressed a desire to participate in the work of the European Parliament in Strasbourg. The delegation suggested that a "Parliamentary Committee on association with Greece" should be constituted, comprising 14 members each of the Greek Parliament and of the European Parliament, to give Greek parliamentarians an opportunity to co-operate with the European Parliament.

BOOKS PRESENTED TO NEJAT LIBRARY

KABUL, Oct. 10.—A number of science and vocational books were presented to the library of the Nejat High School by Dr. Pecket, Charge d'Affaires of the Embassy of the Federal Republic of Germany in Kabul. Dr. Pecket delivered a short speech on the occasion in which he alluded to the cultural relations between Afghanistan and the Federal Republic of Germany.

Mr. Alakozai thanked him for the presentation of the books. The books are on art, literature, social, economic and medical sciences and on the culture of Eastern countries.

IN SOUTH RHODESIA BECOMING 'ANOTHER ALGERIA'

Nationalist Leader Warns Against "Bloody Revolution"

NEW YORK, Oct. 10, (Reuter).—A leading Southern Rhodesian African nationalist said yesterday "bloody revolution" was the next stage in the country, where the situation was rapidly becoming "another Algeria."

Mr. Ndabaningi Sithole, National Chairman of the banned Zimbabwe African People's Union (ZAPU), was addressing the Trusteeship Committee which on Monday night urged Britain to secure the release of the restricted ZAPU leader, Mr. Joshua Nkomo.

Mr. Sithole said the recent "reign of terror" by the Southern Rhodesian authorities, with the banning of ZAPU and the detention of its leaders, had been followed by a "counter-terror" with the burning of European-owned farmland.

The African people were "desperate" and it was impossible under present conditions for the two racial groups ever to come to terms. The situation was rapidly becoming "another Algeria."

Southern Rhodesia had entered the stage of disruption, he added. "Bloody revolution is the next phase." The whole police force was openly against ZAPU, while members of the ruling United Federal Party (UFP) were allowed or even provided with firearms.

WELL-KNOWN PARIS PUBLISHER DEAD

PARIS, Oct. 10, (Reuter).—Sylvia Beach, American-born bookshop owner and publisher who first published James Joyce's Ulysses, has died in Paris, aged 75, it was learnt last night.

Miss Beach, who was born in Baltimore and came to France as a Red Cross nurse in 1917, opened a bookshop in Paris after the war, Shakespeare and Company, which became famous in the 1920s as the meeting place of American literary hopefuls.

She was a close friend of Gertrude Stein, Sherwood Andersen, Ernest Hemingway and Ezra Pound as well as the French writers, Paul Valery and Andre Gide.

CHAREKAR CITY MAP COMPLETED

KABUL, Oct. 10.—The new map of Charekar city has been completed and work on the extension of auxiliary avenues will start soon.

A meeting held at the saloon of the Charekar Municipal Corporation discussed the final details of the map and preparations for the actual construction work. The meeting was attended by municipal representatives and dignitaries.

Mr. Maqool, the City Mayor, told a Bakhtar correspondent that the new city would be built around the central part of the present town. It includes 6,000 modern residential buildings, parks, recreational grounds, children's playgrounds, mosque, cinema, theatre, modern baths and ample electric power. In its first stages the city will occupy an area of 3,000 acres.

No Provocation By U.N.

TSHOMBE'S CHARGE DENIED

NEW YORK, Oct. 10, (Reuter).—One officer, a junior N.C.O. and 33 soldiers took part in what Tshombe yesterday described as the "vast operation of intimidation and provocation" by the U.N. at the Post Office and a former hospital in Elisabethville, it was stated here last night.

A U.N. spokesman, replying to the Katangese leader's assertion, said the patrol had been sent to the area to "observe any untoward activity."

When none was seen, the patrol returned to its base at 4 a.m. local time yesterday. It had been out about three hours. Many of the men stayed in the vehicles in which they travelled to the area, the spokesman said.

He specifically denied that the U.N. had committed any provocation or behaved in a bellicose way.

Makhmoor Meets Chinese Vice-Premier

PEKING, Oct. 10.—The Vice Premier of the People's Republic of China, Dr. Lu Ting-yi received and had a cordial talk with Mr. Abdul Hamid Makhmoor, Adviser to the Press and Information Department of the Afghan Government and President of the Afghan Journalists' Association, and Dr. Ghulam Farouk Etemadi, Professor of Kabul University on October 8.

Present on the occasion were Mr. Ting Hsi-lin, Vice-Chairman of the Commission for Cultural Relations with Foreign Countries and Mr. Cheng Chin-ping, Deputy Director of the Department of Asian Affairs of the Foreign Ministry. Mr. Mohammad Shuaib Meskinyar, the Afghan Ambassador to the People's Republic of China was also present.

Uganda Not To Recognize S. Africa Or Rhodesia

KAMPALA, Oct. 10, (Reuter).—Mr. Milton Obote, Prime Minister of Uganda, announced on the first day of independence yesterday that his country "will not recognize South Africa or the Government of the Rhodesian Federation."

Speaking at a Press conference after Uganda's independence was proclaimed at midnight yesterday night, he said he would announce Uganda's decision in respect of Portugal "very soon."

He said there was "great deal of deceit in the Governments of South Africa, Central Africa and Portugal in recognizing the Government of Uganda as an African Government and not according the same respect to Africans under their control."

Shortly before, the Duke of Kent had formally handed over constitutional instruments by which Britain surrendered her 63-year-old protectorate over Uganda and recognized the independence of the new nation.

ANOTHER SUCCESS FOR THE U.N. U.N. Operation Smooth, Says Brig. Rikhye

NEW YORK, Oct. 10, (Reuter).—Brigadier Indarjit Rikhye, Military Adviser to the UN Secretary-General, said yesterday that the United Nations operation in West Irian was "proceeding smoothly without a single incident."

Brigadier Rikhye returned here on Friday after a two-month assignment in West Irian as head of the U.N. Military Observer team sent to supervise implementation of the recent Netherlands-Indonesia settlement, which provided for the transfer of power in West Irian from the Netherlands to the United Nations and then to Indonesia. The agreement also provides for self-determination by the Papuan inhabitants in 1969.

Brigadier Rikhye described the progress in implementing the agreement as "another page" in the success of the United Nations.

He said that the only problem he encountered—a Papuan demand to fly a national flag—had been settled peacefully.

U.N. officials explained to Papuan leaders that the Dutch-Indonesian agreement provided for Dutch and U.N. flags to be flown before October 1 and for Indonesian and U.N. flags to be flown thereafter. Since no mention was made of a Papuan flag, it could not be recognized, the U.N. officials said.

The leaders understood the U.N. position, Brigadier Rikhye said, and decided that those who wanted to fly a Papuan flag could do so from their homes but not from public property.

Brigadier Rikhye praised the efforts on Indonesian and Dutch officials who desired "full implementation" of the agreement.

PREMIER DAUD'S MESSAGE TO OBOTE

KABUL, Oct. 10.—Sardar Mohammad Daoud, the Prime Minister of Afghanistan, has sent a congratulatory telegram to Mr. Milton Obote, Prime Minister of Uganda, on the occasion of that country becoming independent. The good wishes of the Government and people of Afghanistan for the Government of Uganda have been expressed in this telegram.

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Conference On Skilled Manpower Problems

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10, (DPA).—Mr. William F. Haddad, Associate Director of the U.S. Peace Corps, will be Secretary-General of the three-day conference on "Human Skills in the Decade of Development," opening today at San Juan, Puerto Rico.

Mr. John F. Killes, U.S. Consul-General in Monterrey, Mexico, until last July, will be Deputy Secretary-General. Mr. James Silberman, formerly Far East Regional Director for the U.S. Peace Corps, will act as Technical Secretary.

Ministers and Cabinet members from 43 nations and representatives of nine international organizations will gather to discuss the problem of skilled manpower in the developing nations co-operating in planning the conference are the Departments of Health, Education and Welfare, Labour, Commerce, State, the Agency for International Development, and the Peace Corps.

FRENCH ELECTION DATES

PARIS, Oct. 10, (Reuter).—The outgoing Cabinet of M. Georges Pompidou today finally settles the dates of France's general election next month to replace the National Assembly ousted by a censure vote last Friday.

They are expected to be held on November 18 and 25—three weeks after the referendum set by President de Gaulle for October 28 to approve his plan for election of his successors by universal suffrage.

Leaders of the Opposition parties who overthrew the Pompidou Government over the de Gaulle proposal, which they contend is unconstitutional, hold a Press conference today following a joint strategy meeting yesterday.

KENNEDY'S MESSAGE TO ADENAUER German-U.S. Co-operation Stressed

BONN, Oct. 10, (DPA).—The West German Chancellor, Dr. Konrad Adenauer, has received a personal message from President Kennedy underlining the trustful German-American co-operation, it was reliably learnt here last night.

Mr. Kennedy's message underlines that co-operation with reference to the recent visit to the United States of the West German Economic Minister and Vice-Chancellor, Dr. Ludwig Erhard.

Official Bonn sources declined to give any details on the contents of the message and the way in which it had been communicated.

The mission also visited some of the projects launched by the Ministry of Education.

SOVIET M. P.s INVITED TO VISIT INDIA

MOSCOW, Oct. 10. (Tass).—Sardar Hukam Singh, the head of the Indian Parliamentary delegation, on behalf of the Indian Parliament, has invited a delegation of the Supreme Soviet of the USSR to visit India.

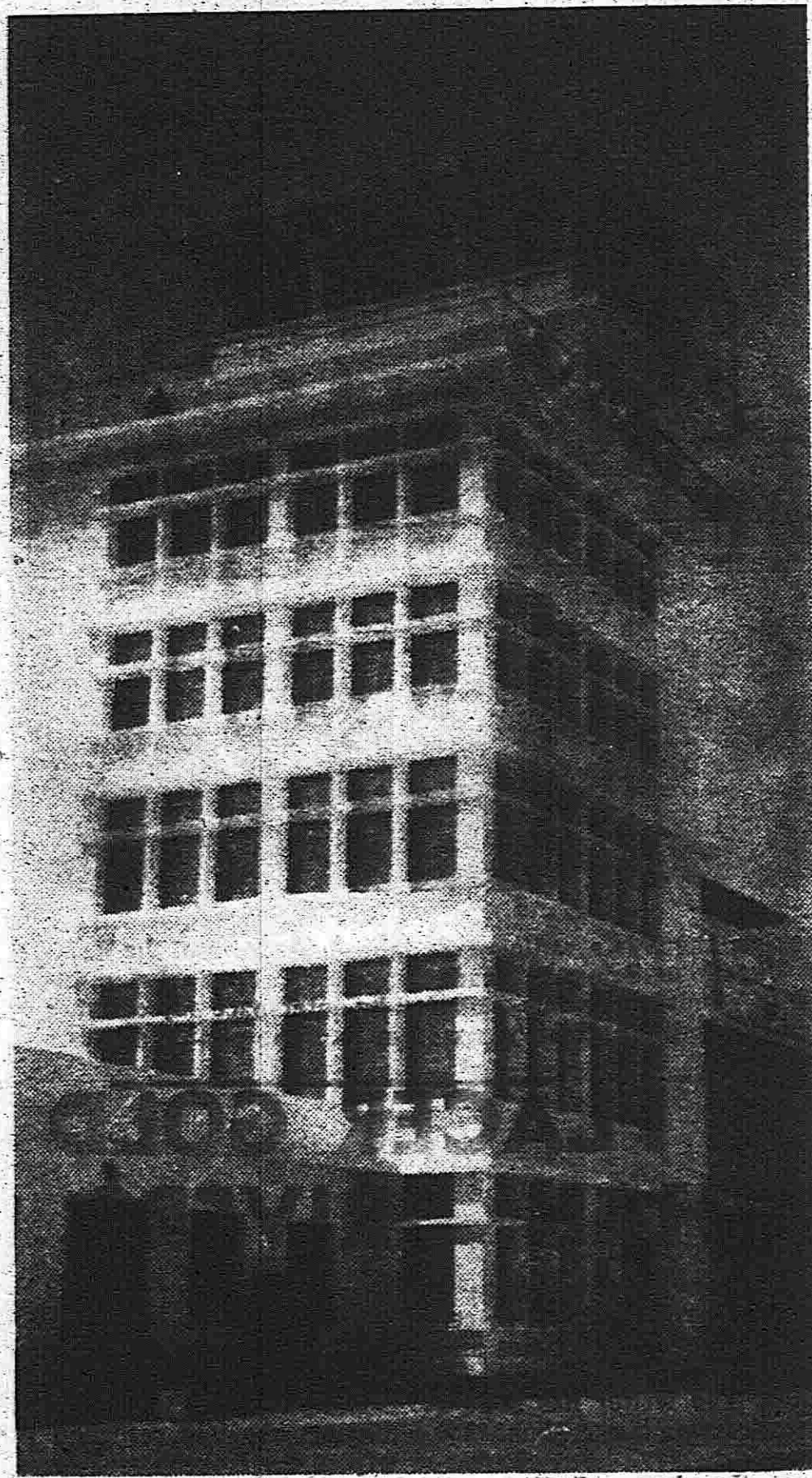
This is reported in a joint communique on the stay of Indian Parliament members in the USSR where they spent 19 days visiting several Soviet Republics. They were received by the President of the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet of the USSR Mr. Leonid Brezhnev, and were accorded a warm welcome everywhere.

The Indian delegates, the communique points out, have been greatly impressed by the scale of peaceful construction in the USSR and the enthusiasm of Soviet people in building a new society.

MOSCOW, Oct. 10. (DPA).—The Soviet Export Trade Organisation "Exportles" and the Iraqi Railway authority have concluded a contract on the delivery of 200,000 Soviet railway sleepers, to be used in constructing a railway link between Baghdad and Basra.

PARIS, Oct. 10. (DPA).—Guinea and Algeria have taken up preliminary conversations aimed at developing commercial exchanges. The meetings are taking place in Algiers between the Algerian Minister for Commerce, M. Mohamed Khobzi, and Guinean mission led by M. Baba Kamara, Director of National Production.

CANBERRA, Oct. 10. (DPA).—Indonesia's arms build up was to serve internal security and to protect the long coastline against smugglers, and should give Australia no cause for alarm. Indonesian Ambassador to Canberra Brigadier-General Saudi said here yesterday. Indonesia's national revolution ended with the solution of the West Irian problem, the Ambassador added.

Algeria To Respect Evian Agreements BEN BELLA REAFFIRMS POLICY AT U.N. ASSEMBLY

NEW YORK, Oct. 10. (Reuter).—Algeria's Prime Minister, Mr. Ben Bella, yesterday affirmed his Government's adherence to the Evian Agreements, providing for close co-operation between the new nation and France, which ruled the country for 132 years.

In his first pronouncement in an international forum, the 43-year-old independence leader, who was in a French jail when the agreement was signed, told the General Assembly: "Our people, our Government are formally dedicated to the respect of the accord which was freely concluded."

The agreement provided for the retention by France of military bases in Algeria, for joint French-Algerian exploitation of Sahara Oil resources and guarantees for the future of the European population of the country.

Mr. Ben Bella told the 109-member Assembly that the accord would be respected as much by the Algerian people as had been their will for independence.

Mr. Ben Bella paid high tribute to U Thant, the Acting Secretary-General, who as former delegate of Burma, was Chairman of the Afro-Asian Group's special drafting committee on the Algeria question.

"In the spirit of our people, his name is associated with the principle of emancipation, liberty and peace provided for in the Charter," the Premier said.

Tribute to Martyrs
Mr. Ben Bella said that Algeria's first thought today was to the martyrs who had offered their lives so that their country might enter the community of independent nations.

On behalf of the Algerian Government, Mr. Ben Bella thanked

those delegates who over the years had supported Algeria's "just cause."

He expressed particular gratitude to the Arab countries and "all those which resolutely aligned themselves with the Algerian people."

Applause greeted his statement that Algeria would give unqualified support in helping to bring about final and total liberation for the people of Angola, Rhodesia, South Africa and South-West Africa.

The Algerian delegation would make its first duty a demand that the General Assembly's resolution on colonialism be accompanied by concrete measures against those States that refused to implement it.

The "brother Arab people of Palestine" must have their legitimate rights reinstated. It was dangerous for peace and international stability for this painful problem to remain unsolved.

Mr. Ben Bella referred to Algeria's policy of non-alignment with Power blocs. This was not expressed by any passive attitude, he said. Algeria would try to be a responsible country in full freedom of conscience.

In welcoming Algeria to the U.N. members had shown their confidence in Algeria and at the same time delegated certain rights. These Algeria would assume.

Crisis Over Berlin "Possible"

LAS VEGAS, Nevada, Oct. 10. (Reuter).—The U.S. Attorney-General, Mr. Robert Kennedy, said last night that a major crisis over Berlin was "quite possible" in the near future.

"It is quite possible that we will face a great crisis in Berlin in the weeks just ahead," President Kennedy's brother, said in a speech prepared for the American Legion National Convention here.

Mr. Kennedy did not go into detail over the crisis possibility. "The determination and unity of this country to maintain our position in West Berlin is apparent."

"American military strength has increased and we face that possible crisis with confidence," he declared.

German Bank To Open Office In Tokyo

TOKYO, Oct. 10. (DPA).—The West German "Deutsche Bank" would shortly set up an office in Tokyo, it was stated here by Bank Director Heinrich Ulrich as reported by "Kyodo" News Agency yesterday.

Mr. Ulrich in this connexion expressed the hope that the planned office would facilitate closer economic exchange between Japan and West Germany, such as the establishment of joint industrial concerns or the easing of instalment payments for the export of West German goods.

Referring to the prospects of West German capital being made available for the Japanese market Ulrich said that the joint enterprise would be the sole form for such an advance of German capital.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10. (Reuter).—Mr. Dean Rusk, United States Secretary of State, said yesterday the inter-American allies were united in moving more vigorously to check Cuba's "use against us of their concealed instruments of war."

At an informal meeting, the Council of the Organization of American States is to consider steps to counter such possibility and re-examine the trade relations of the American republics with Cuba, he added.

KABUL, Oct. 10.—A theatrical course was launched yesterday by the Press and Information Department for training personnel for the country's theatres. The launching of the course had been approved by the High Council of Ministers.

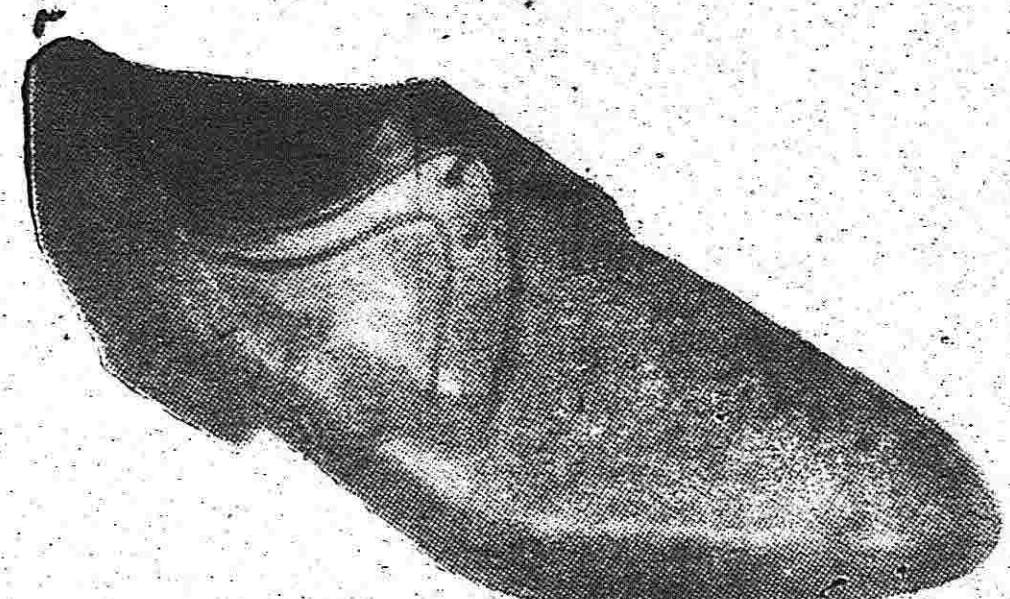
