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In his statement, Dr. Popal explained the educational development plans. He said the people's crave for education is so tense that unfortunately we cannot meet all their demands.

People these days are not satisfied with lower certificates and most of them want their children to acquire higher education. Dr. Popal added it is important for the Ministry of Education to continually revise its educational programmes and to maintain contact with other ministries and organizations in charge of the advancement of social affairs. Exchanging views and discussions are the best methods of achieving close co-operation. The most important educational drawback, the Minister said, is the lack of text books. All the stocks that were printed locally or imported from abroad were used during the first five year plan, he said.

He said that the printing houses in the country were all busy producing text books. However, more than 14 million volumes were needed for the second educational plan.

"We are trying to improve our printing houses through the help offered by bigger printing houses abroad and assistance offered by friendly countries," Dr. Popal said.

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Similarly the Prime Minister Yousuf, who had been a teacher for many years is closely acquainted with problems facing the Ministry of Education in Afghanistan.

Today also the focal point of Governmental plans in the field of education will be to train the younger generation, struggle against illiteracy and promote vocational and higher education.

He said that it was the duty of the directors and teachers to acquaint the students and the public in general about the activities of the Government. He added, it should not be forgotten that the word "change", does not mean lack of discipline, and anarchy.

"As the Minister of Education I want to emphatically request that all connected with the advancement of education should have in mind the importance of positive discipline and education and to bring up the students as men of principle and true patriots.

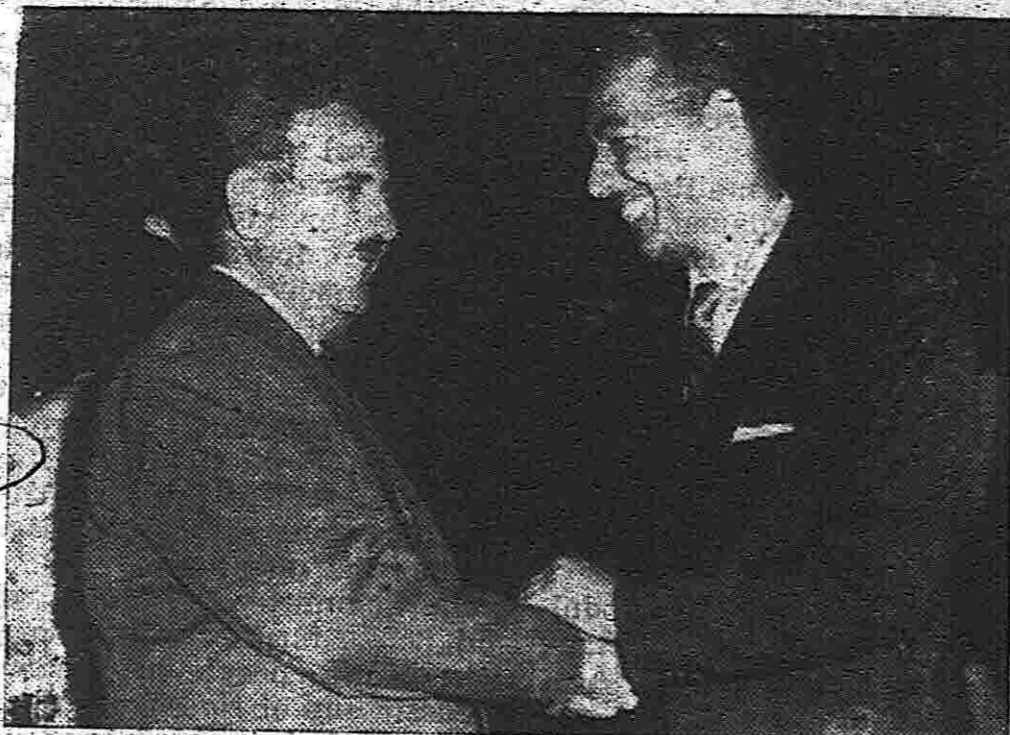
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In the picture Mr. Abdullah Mallkyar, the First Deputy Premier and Minister of Finance is being welcomed by Mr. Abu Shadi.

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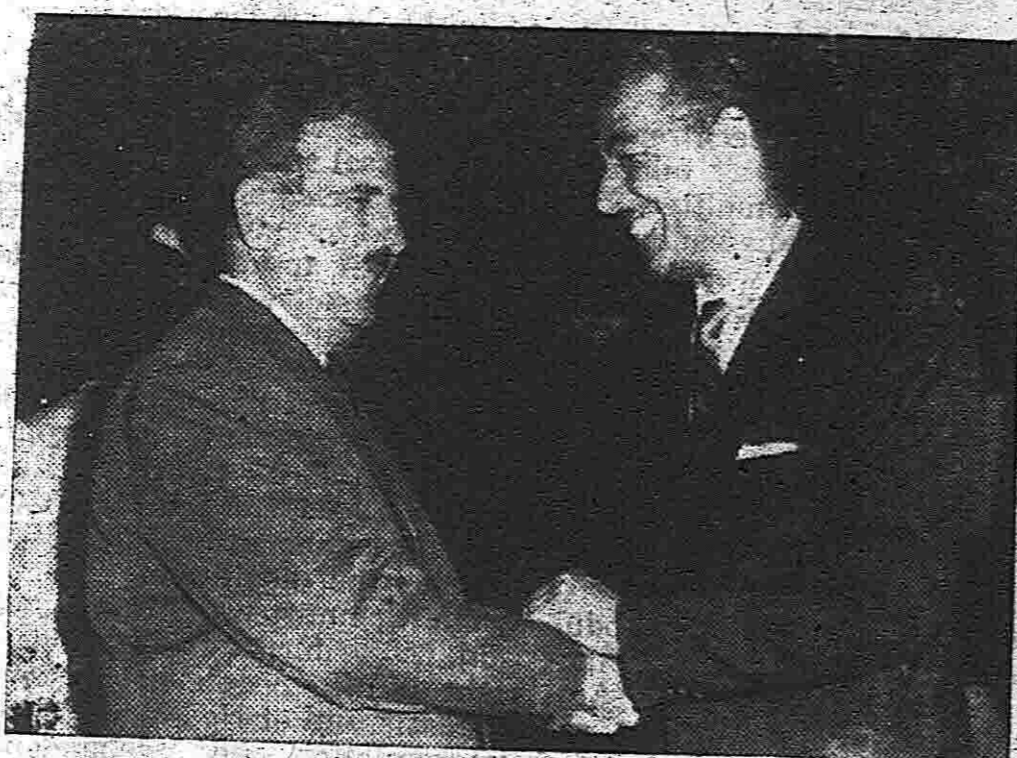

AGRICULTURAL RESEARCH AND EXPERIMENTATION

Agricultural research has been on of the basic programmes for agricultural development in Afghanistan. The plans launched in the country have outlined a comprehensive programme of research which comprised the following: (a) Research on the special problems of cultivation of cotton, beetroot and sugarcane; (b) Research on problems of animal husbandry (Karakul and merino sheep) and sericulture; (c) Research on technological aspects of cotton and wool (length and resistance of fibres); (d) Research on problem of mechanisation; and (e) Research on plant and animal diseases.

Soviet Scientists Study Laser Ray Effects On Liquids

Soviet scientists have started for the first time to study the behaviour of liquids under the influence of an intense laser ray. It is known that a usual ray of light, when passing through liquid, is visibly absorbed and dispersed by minute particles, bits of silt and other matter present in the liquid. Now how will a laser ray—a strong artificial ray of light—pass through such a liquid? A group of Soviet physicists—experimentators, Gergen Askaryan, Alexander Prokhorov, Georgy Shipulo and Georgy Chanturia, took up this problem. The experiments conducted yielded interesting results. The mighty ray of light itself created centres causing dispersion of light. Around each minute particle the ray formed a bubble of steam that dispersed light many times stronger than the particle itself.

treaty with the Soviet Union and Britain, informed sources here said on Tuesday.

But the sources added that it was possible President Kennedy might prefer to have a treaty signed by the three heads of Government in the capital of each of them.

Macmillan's Comments

According to AP Prime Minister Harold Macmillan said Tuesday he would willingly attend a summit conference if the Moscow test ban negotiations produced a thaw.

He was closely questioned in the House of Commons about the progress of the Moscow negotiations for a nuclear test ban.

Picking his words carefully, the Prime Minister replied: "I hope we may soon find these negotiations reach a satisfactory conclusion."

"If they do, it will be, of course, a great step forward, and it is one for which we have strived for a long time."

Arthur Henderson, a Labour Party member, suggested that Mr. Macmillan should lead the British delegation to the U.N. General Assembly meeting in New York this September.

Mr. Henderson argued that Mr. Macmillan, by following such a course, could meet with President Kennedy and Premier Khrushchov and other national leaders without the publicity bound to accompany a formal summit conference.

"Will you indicate that you would be willing to go if Mr. Khrushchov were to indicate a willingness to go?" Mr. Henderson asked.

Mr. Macmillan replied: "I would be willing to do anything helpful. I still think that much depends on the next few days. If these go well we can see how to develop the next steps."

France: Non-Committal

France noted Tuesday the prospect of a three-power limited nuclear test ban agreement with non-committal caution. Official spokesmen declined comment on an accord between the United States, Britain and the Soviet Union.

One reason for the caution is that the French Government these days is pretty much a one man show. President Charles de Gaulle is holding a new conference next Monday, and no official wants to try to anticipate the General's position.

Syria To Still Work For Unity Despite Nasser's Refusal To Join Ba'ath

DAMASCUS, Syria, Wednesday, July 24, (AP).—A Government spokesman said Tuesday Syria will still work for Arab Unity despite U.A.R. President Nasser's refusal to merge with its Ba'ath Socialist regime.

He said that President Nasser's scrapping of the pact to link U.A.R., Iraq and Syria did not mean it was finished forever. The spokesman hinted Syria might now work for a two-country union of Iraq and Syria.

"Arabs are one people", the Ba'athist spokesman Information Minister Sami Jundi, declared. "If there is difficulty between Syria and U.A.R. in forming a Union, that does not mean these difficulties will prevent another Arab Union."

Mr. Jundi spoke as Damascus was recovering from last Thursday's armed uprising against the Ba'athist regime in Syria, in which Mr. Jundi said fewer than 200 persons were killed.

The Revolutionary Council is conducting a secret investigation, Mr. Jundi said, to find out details of the plot and whether President Nasser was personally involved in it.

He shrugged off President Nasser's claim that Damascus was "streaming with blood" by waving his hands at the calm city outside his office.

He said most of those killed were not involved in the battle "but the streets were full when the fighting began...it was not our

fault."

About 2,000 armed rebels, most of whom were surrounded and arrested, took part in the coup aimed at overthrowing the Government and declaring immediate Union with U.A.R. Mr. Jundi said. Some have been released, he added.

Fewer than 100 non-combatants were arrested, he said, and about 30 among 58 prominent pro-Nasserites wanted for investigation turned themselves in before the Revolutionary Councils ultimatum expired Tuesday.

New Director General Of Home Publications

KABUL, July 24.—Mr. Nazar Mohammad Nava has been appointed Acting Director General of Local Publications in the Ministry of Press and Information. The appointment was proposed by the Ministry and approved by the higher authorities.

JIRGA DEMANDS PAKHTUNISTAN'S INDEPENDENCE

KABUL, July 24.—A report from Momand, Northern Independent Pakhtunistan, says that a large national Jirga was recently held at the congregational mosque in Sheikh-Baba town; the meeting was attended by divines, chieftains, representatives and a large number of Safi and Shinwari tribesmen.

The meeting was addressed by a number of divines and elders on the subject of defending the freedom of Pakhtunistan.

They demanded from the Government of Pakistan to concede immediately their legitimate rights and also release political prisoners in Occupied Pakhtunistan.

Similarly, the national elders condemned in their speeches the intervention of the Government of Pakistan in Bajawar territory and the bombardment of Maidan and Jandol.

The Jirga warned the Government of Pakistan to desist from further aggressions against Independent Pakhtunistan otherwise it will be responsible for the serious consequences of such actions.

Showered With Furs, Jewelry And Cash: "Mandy" Rice-Davies Tells Her Love Story

LONDON, July 24, (DPA).—Marilyn (Mandy) Rice-Davies, at 18 the youngest witness in the Stephen Ward vice trial, on Tuesday told the court for two hours about her many loves, some for money, others not.

Honey-blond Mandy, composed and self-assured, smiled occasionally as she told the crowded court room about the men with whom she had slept.

Among her lovers she mentioned actor Douglas Fairbanks Junior and Lord Astor.

(Thrice married Lord Astor is 56 years old. He married his present wife, former model Bronwen Pugh, daughter of a

judge, in 1960).

Mandy continued her tale of love in her life saying slum landlord Peter Rachmand had showered her with furs, jewelry and cash.

Spectators, some of whom had been waiting since the early hours of the morning to take a seat in the court room, listened intently as Mandy spoke of her relationship with Stephen Ward, and how he had introduced her to "a rich Indian boy", with whom she later had sexual intercourse for payment.

With her testimony on Tuesday Mandy further incriminated Stephen Ward who has been

charged with living on immoral earnings, among other things.

Christine Keeler also testified against Ward when the trial opened on Monday at London's Old Bailey. She and Mandy Rice Davies had lived at Wards for some time and admitted that they had given him money on various occasions.

Wards counsel during cross examination accused Mandy of exaggerating her testimony in order to get more money for her "memoires" which she was selling to newspapers.

Mandy admitted that she had been negotiating with newspapers to sell her story.
