THEIR MAJESTIES WARMLY RECEIVED IN HAMBURG

Afghan King And Queen To Arrive In Munich Today

HAMBURG, Saturday, Aug. 10.—Their Majesties the King and the Queen left yesterday Hamburg by train for Munich. The President of Hamburg Senate, high ranking officials and Afghans residing in Hamburg saw Their Majesties off.

Their Majesties are to arrive in Munich today. Shortly after arriving in Hamburg Thursday Their Majesties the King and the Queen visited the Municipal building of Hamburg and signed the Golden Book.

Their Majesties were received by the Mayor of Hamburg, who in a brief welcoming statement praised the long standing friendly relations between Afghanistan and the Federal Republic of Germany.

Their Majesties also visited the city port of Hamburg on the same day.

Thursday afternoon, Their Majesties the King and the Queen visited the Hamburg Senate. Their Majesties were received at the building entrance by the President and Members of the Senate and a large number of people.

Their Majesties then signed the city's golden book. President of the Hamburg City's Senate expressed delight in Their Majesties' visit to the city of Hamburg and hoped that the visit would further strengthen relations between Afghanistan and the Federal Republic of Germany.

His Majesty the King expressed appreciation for the friendly sentiments of the Senate President and said all Afghans knew Hamburg and that most of Afghanistan's export to European countries were routed through Hamburg.

His Majesty said, "Please accept the kindest wishes of myself, the Queen and the Afghan nation for the progress and prosperity of the people of Hamburg."

The President of Hamburg Senate then presented a specially made medal to His Majesty the King and a Tea Set manufactured in Hamburg to Her Majesty the Queen.

National Anthems of Afghanistan and the Federal Republic of Germany were played when Their Majesties left the Senate building.

At Hamburg port Their Majesties were greeted warmly by a large number of people. Their Majesties then boarded a special yacht and inspected a number of facilities and establishments of the port.

Their Majesties' yacht was being escorted by a number of small boats.

On alighting from the yacht Their Majesties were welcomed by the Chief of the port.

Thursday night Their Majesties attended a reception by the chief of Hamburg Senate. Speeches were exchanged between His Majesty the King and the Senate President. The function was attended by distinguished personalities and Diplomatic Corps in Hamburg and their wives.

Yesterday Their Majesties made a tour of Hamburg City and visited an international garden exhibition, held in the city. Late in the afternoon Their Majesties left Hamburg for Munich by a

special train.

Further to the Bakhtar report from Bonn on Wednesday, Their Majesties the King and Queen, while visiting the Municipal Hall at Bonn, the Mayor of Bonn in an address of welcome recalled the friendship existing between the Federal Republic of Germany and Afghanistan and expressed pleasure at the affiliation arrangements made between the Bonn and Kabul Universities.

The Mayor of Bonn presented a set of gramophone records of prominent German composers to His Majesty.

In reply, His Majesty mentioned the very close ties existing between Afghanistan and the German Federal Republic and expressed the hope that relations between them would be further strengthened.

Brazil was the first to sign, followed by a group which included Denmark, Afghanistan, Norway, Argentina, Chile, Turkey, Holland, Greece, Ireland and Sudan.

According to separate reports from Washington and London, Afghanistan Ambassadors to the United States and Britain have also signed the agreement on behalf of the government of Afghanistan.

PRIME MINISTER AGAIN RECEIVES PROVINCIAL EDUCATION DIRECTORS

Schools Should Not Only Teach But Also Prepare Public For Social Changes

KABUL, Saturday, Aug. 10.—The provincial directors of education were again received by Dr. Mohammad Yousuf, the Prime Minister at Sadarat Palace on Thursday; Dr. Ali Ahmad Popal, the Minister of Education and Second Deputy Prime Minister, the two Deputy Ministers of Education and the Deputy Minister of Planning were also present.

Mr. Kennedy's Infant Son Dies

BOSTON, Massachusetts, Aug. 10, (Reuter).—Richard cardinal cushing, archbishop of Boston, celebrates in his private chapel here today a requiem "mass of the angels" for Patrick Bouvier Kennedy, infant son of the President and Mrs. Kennedy.

The premature baby, first born to a president in office for 68 years, died of a lung ailment early yesterday in Boston children's hospital medical centre. He was just 39 hours 12 minutes old.

The cardinal, a close friend of the Kennedy family, will wear white vestment for the mass—a special one for babies. It is almost one of rejoicing that a soul free of sin has entered heaven.

Only members of the President's immediate family will attend the mass and the burial at the family plot in holyrood cemetery.

The President, who had kept a vigil at the hospital, was present when his second son died in a giant submarine-like breathing chamber—the only one of its kind in the world.

Then he went to comfort his 34-year-old wife, Jacqueline, recovering from a caesarean operation at Otis Air Force base hospital on Cape Cod. Later he broke the news to his other children, Caroline, five and a half, and John Jr., two and a half, at his summer home on Squaw Island, Cape Cod.

Mr. Mayel, the Chief of Primary Education, explained to the Prime Minister the proposals and decisions made by the Annual Conference of the Directors of Education while Dr. Ziyae, the Chief of the Planning Board of the Ministry of Education clarified with appropriate facts and figures the Development Plan of the Ministry of Education and Kabul University.

Dr. Popal stressed the need for closer co-operation between the school and community and said that the Ministry of Education should endeavour to increase the share of the public in education.

The Directors of Education present explained the educational position in their respective provinces.

Prime Minister Dr. Mohammad Yousuf expressed satisfaction at the over-all picture of the educational position described to him and said that the directors of education had the duty of not only teaching but also educating public opinion in the area.

"They should", he said, "explain and publicize the Government's programme for reforms and thus prepare the public for basic social changes".

The Prime Minister promised to extend every possible moral and material support to education and urged the Directors to try to gain the confidence and support of the public.

The Directors of Education lunched with Mr. Malikyar, the First Deputy Prime Minister and Dr. Popal, the Second Deputy Prime Minister.

Thant Announces Plan For Finding North Borneo And Sarawakis' Views

UNITED NATIONS, Saturday, Aug. 10, (DPA).—U.N. Secretary-General U Thant has spelled out the way in which he believes the United Nations might help determine the will of the people of North Borneo and Sarawak on the proposed Federation of Malaysia.

The Secretary-General said he would set up two working teams to operate in each of the territories.

U Thant emphasized, however, that "I can undertake this responsibility only with the consent" of the British Government, which administers the territories. He said he is in touch with

British U.N. Ambassador Sir Patrick Dean and will take the first step only after the British agree to United Nations help.

The Secretary General outlined his plans in identical letters to the foreign ministers of Malaya, Indonesia and the Philippines.

Triumph For Africans

The Security Council debate which took place on the basis of a request by African states on the colonial policy of Portugal and racial segregation in South Africa has ended, and it can be clearly stated that the results of this debate and also the resolution adopted by that body, are clearly a triumph for Africans. The Portuguese policy in its African territories was condemned and all states were asked not to provide such arms for Portugal which may be used in suppressing freedom movement in Africa which is in full swing. The apartheid policy pursued by the Government of South Africa was once again assailed, and nations were urged to discontinue arms shipments to South Africa. South Africa is not in any way entangled in the so-called East-West cold war, and yet it has been purchasing arms from abroad on an unprecedented scale. The purpose for this acquisition of weapons is to have sufficient power to quell any uprising of a population who are primarily non-Europeans, against the government's policy of apartheid. Several European countries, including Great Britain and France, have been providing arms to South Africa. The Government of the United States has announced that it will stop all sales of arms to South Africa by the end of 1963. It is regrettable that France and England did not heed to world public opinion and refused to subscribe to a move of banning shipment of arms to South Africa, by abstaining on a resolution adopted by the Security Council.

It is not the first time that the Security Council or other United Nations bodies have condemned the two nations for their policies in Africa. But the fact in this case is that all nations have been asked to stop shipment of arms to Portugal and South Africa. Similarly, the issue of an embargo against South Africa which was favoured, clearly in (Contd. on page 4)

RESULTS OF MANILA SUMMIT THE LANGUAGE PRESS AT A GLANCE

The Summit Conference between President Sukarno, Malaysian Prime Minister Tunku Abdul Rahman and Philippines President Diosdado Macapagal was concluded at the Luna Hall of the Philippine Foreign Office here this morning with the signing of three historical summit documents as the results of victory of the spirit of "musjawarah" and "consultations" among the three Malay countries—Malaya, Indonesia and the Philippines.

The three documents were constituted of reports and recommendations of the foreign ministers of the three countries coined in the joint communiqué issued on June last and now agreed upon and accepted by the three Heads of Government.

2. A Manila declaration which contained the basic principles on formation of Maphilindo and; 3. A joint statement governing all decisions which had been adopted during the summit of the three Heads of Government on a number of issues of common concern.

With the documents, agreement was reached on ways and means on jointly resolving the Malaysia issue and self determination for the people of Kalimantan Utara (North Borneo), a thorny point in the course of negotiations, in particular. Malaya had agreed that the right of self determination for the peoples of Kalimantan Utara, should be conducted before the formation of Malaysia planned on August 31.

UNESCO And Afghan Educational Plans: DR. ZIYAEI'S SPEECH BEFORE EDUCATIONAL DIRECTORS

Possibilities of Obtaining Assistance from the Specialized Agencies of the United Nations:

(a) The UNESCO Mission, even though of the opinion that a second such Mission should be sent out to Afghanistan to study the qualitative aspect of education, yet considered the period of 4 to 6 months insufficient for this purpose. The Mission, therefore, suggested that instead four top-notch experts of primary, secondary and agricultural education and teacher-training should be requested for a period of three years. These experts are required to co-operate with the previous experts of UNESCO in Kabul and to advise the Ministry of Education on the qualitative aspect of education and its improvement.

(b) Requests from UNICEF and UNESCO for the years 1964-65: The UNESCO Mission was of the opinion that teacher-training in the school of this name was of the utmost importance for improving the quality of education and raising the standards of teaching and the teachers' qualifications; therefore, the work done by the Columbia University Team and the College of Pedagogy, the Mission's report said, must be appreciated, but, at the same time, it was not enough in view of the rapid expansion of education in the country, especially for the future. The Mission, therefore, recommended that 12 internationally-experienced experts of education should be engaged with the help of international agencies. The Mission considered, in view of the small number of graduates available from the Colleges of Science, Letters and Education, the employment of College graduates from these

places in Middle Schools; instead, the Mission thought an extension of the Middle School Teachers' Training School to the 12th Grade. It was also suggested that this School may be further extended to include the 14th Grade. Higher Teachers' College: The UNESCO Mission among its recommendations concerning teacher-training has suggested that an Academy of Teachers for Primary Schools should be founded; it was also proposed that assistance for this purpose should be obtained from the United Nations Special Fund. But when such a request was sent to the UN Special Fund, it was rejected on the ground that the S.F. was not interested in primary education. The Ministry of Education, therefore, revised its request and instead proposed the request in this establishment of a Higher Teachers' College; it must be stated that the request in the regard was also formulated with the help of UNESCO Mission.

The Higher Teachers' College will be located next to the Teacher-Training School in Kabul (Darul-Moallamein) and a number of the School's buildings will be allocated to the College. During the first few years the 10th, 11th and 12th Grades of the Teacher-Training School will be allowed to continue, but these will be gradually removed in the following years and new buildings, too, will be erected. The College will utilise the adjoining Ibn-i-Sina Laboratory School for its work.

Enrollment in the Higher Teachers' College will be as fol-

low: First Year: (1964): 100 students (men and women). Second Year: (1965): 100 students (First batch of graduates will be given out by the end of the year). Third Year (1966): 150 students will be enrolled every year. In 1969 the number of new entrants will rise to 200 and in 1975 to 400. Hostel facilities will be provided for a number of students because it is not envisaged to provide these facilities for women students at first and, therefore, girl-students will be enrolled from the Kabul area alone.

French Court Sentences Former OAS Members PARIS, Aug. 10. (DPA).—A Paris court today sentenced two former members of a French Secret Army Organisation (OAS) command to hard labour for life for the October 1961 murder in more effective in solving the people's complaints, would be of great value in improving the general conditions of the country.

The two command members were 27-year-old Jean-Louis Blanchy and 26-year-old Francois Leca, both of whom listened to the judge pronouncing sentences with a slight smile on their faces. A third accused who also belonged to the same command, 33-year-old Thomas Norrito, was sentenced to five years of forced labour today while a fourth, Hyck Sloboda, was sentenced to death in absentia.

The Paris State Security Court found the command to which all four men belonged responsible for countless murders and raids committed in Algiers in the years 1961 and 1962.

It is true, said the editorial, that the people are interested in the Ministry of Education. The Ministry is entrusted with the momentous task of building the people and guiding them along the path of progress and prosperity. Therefore a direct contact between the Ministry and the people, continued the Paper, is not only desirable but a necessity as well.

The Paper then goes on to say that all ministries and government organizations are also ministries and organizations of the people. Each should represent the interest of the people in their particular fields of activity. Therefore, close contact should be established between every ministry and the people.

In an editorial published specially for children, yesterday's Amis discussed the dangers of street crossing. Now that traffic is constantly increasing, said the Paper, the problem of crossing streets has become important for the children. Children should look both ways before crossing. Under no circumstances should they begin playing in the middle of the road, stressed the Paper.

Thursday's Amis, in its editorial, hailed the Prime Minister's visit to Mir Bacha Kote, to meet with representatives of orchard owners in order to obtain first hand information concerning the peoples problems.

This, said the Paper, is in keeping with the wishes and expectations of the people. The people want their government to be informed about their living conditions. Of course all governments have tried to establish such contacts through officials at various levels. But high-level contacts by cabinet members and the Prime Minister, in addition to being more effective in solving the people's complaints, would be of great value in improving the general conditions of the country.

The latest developments in this country indicate that such high level contacts between the government and the people is part of the government's internal policy. Powerful delegations, including certain cabinet ministers, have recently visited Kandahar, Paktia and Hazara Provinces to understand directly the difficulties of the people, and also to see what steps could be taken for the development of these areas. Now the Prime Minister's visit to Mir Bacha Kote is another example of such contacts.

Newspapers published in the capital on Thursday and Friday carried additional news and pictures in connexion with the state visit of their Majesties the King and Queen to the Federal Republic of Germany. A picture of His Majesty the King inspecting a horse breeding centre near by their heads of government, Cologne, appeared in yesterday's conference Monday.

WEST GERMAN PRESS COVERAGE OF THEIR MAJESTIES VISIT

Federal German newspapers have been publishing articles about their Majesties state visit to the Federal Republic of Germany since their arrival in that country.

The newspapers have assured that Germany's esteemed guest would take back with him as souvenir the unfettered friendship of the German nation.

The daily Frankfurter Allgemeine wrote in this connexion that friendship between the peoples of Afghanistan and Germany have been particularly strengthened since His Majesty Mohammad Zahir Shah's accession to the throne, and has now become a tradition.

The newspaper said it must not be forgotten that Afghanistan, in the second world war, fought bravely for the rights of Germans residing in that country and provided means for their return to Germany.

With the state visit by His Majesty the King of Afghanistan to the Federal Republic of Germany, continued the newspaper, an opportunity has presented itself to the German nation to express their gratitude and appreciation.

The daily Stuttgarter Zeitung also referred to the long standing relations between the Afghan and German nations, pointing out that these relations are continually being strengthened through economic and cultural exchanges.

In its editorial, the paper wrote that a large number of Afghan students were studying at West German Universities. The establishment of the Nejat High School

in 1924, and also the opening of the Kabul School of Mechanics, are to be considered the fruits of this long friendship. Apart from this, the editorial continued, the West German government has had a major role in the economic development of Afghanistan.

The daily Frankfurter Rundschau, has considered His Majesty the King as a monarch favouring fundamental reforms. It wrote that most important of all is the fact that His Majesty the King changed the system of government in March 1963, and paved the way for a modern constitution and a democratic regime.

Under this new regime, the paper continued, the nation has been granted full rights, and the younger generation have been given an increased role in the country's economic and social progress. In regard to its foreign policy, the paper said, Afghanistan will remain non-aligned.

Since the establishment of the Weimer Republic, relations between Afghanistan and Germany have been friendly, and because of this the German nation will receive His Majesty the King of Afghanistan with open arms.

The official statement said Maj. Ormerod would be court-martialled August 16.

Wreath Of Flowers

To Dr. Ward

More than 20 British artists and writers are sending a wreath of flowers carrying the notes "to Stephen Ward, a victim of British hypocrisy" to the society osteopaths grave, it was learned. An inquest on Dr. Ward, who died from an overdose of drug in a London hospital on Saturday, was held Friday.

Dr. Ward, 50-year-old central figure in the Profumo scandal, never regained consciousness to learn that an old Bailey Jury found him guilty last week of living on the immoral earnings of Christine Keeler 21, and her friend Marilyn "Mandy" Rice-Davies, 18.

His funeral, which will be private, was due after Friday inquest.

British Officer To Be Court Martialled

ADEN, Aug. 10. (AP).—Major Walter Ormerod, the British army officer who led a party of 45 British servicemen and women on an adventure training weekend in June which ended up in the Yemeni republic where they were ambushed, will be court-martialled for negligence.

The party, driving at night in the South Arabian Federation, took a wrong turning and went over the border into the Yemen where hostile tribesmen opened fire on them.

Four soldiers were killed. The remainder surrendered and, after detention in a border fort, they were eventually taken to Ta'izz, second capital of the Yemen, where they were released after Britain had paid "blood money" (21,000 dollars). They were in captivity for about a month.

The women in the party were allowed to return to Aden after two days.

icates the adoption of not general but concrete measures, which should be adopted against the two states, in order to make them abandon their policies in Africa.

The African nations have adopted a clear line regarding the policies of Portugal and South Africa. They are determined to free the people of Portuguese African territories from the yoke of colonialism and provide for equal rights in the segregationist state of South Africa. After the Addis Ababa Summit their efforts in this regard yielded good results, and it is quite certain that they will assume a more dramatic form when the 18th session of the General Assembly is convened. A move for the participation of African heads of State is already underway. This participation will further aid the African nations to advance their cause in the United Nations.

governments met recently in Manila to try to resolve the problems concerned with setting up the proposed federation which would include Malaya and Singapore as well as the two territories. They decided to ask for United Nations help.

The Secretary-General emphasized that the working teams "working under the supervision of my representative will be responsible directly and exclusively to me."

SYRIA AND IRAQ CALL FOR TRUCE WITH UAR TO FORM ARAB FEDERATION

DAMASCUS, Syria, Saturday, Aug. 10, (AP).—SYRIA and Iraq urged Friday that President Nasser of the United Arab Republic call a truce in their political feud and salvage plans for the three countries to unite in a federation.

The bid for co-operation among two countries to get together the three nations was made in a joint communique summing up a three-day conference in Baghdad between Iraqi Leaders and seven-man Syrian delegation headed by Premier Salah Bitar.

Issued simultaneously here and in Baghdad, the communique said Iraq "agreed that an end must be brought to the deterioration of the Arab situation" following the collapse of the union agreement.

It said the April 17 Cairo agreement for union of the three into a greater United Arab Republic starting next month, had foundered on a political crisis.

The union plans were wrecked by a bitter feud between UAR and the Socialist Party and Syria. The communique denounced recent attempts in both Baghdad and Damascus to overthrow the twin Ba'ath regimes.

Addis Ababa Picked-Up For OAU's Headquarters

DAKAR, Senegal, Saturday, Aug. 10, (AP).—THE African Foreign Ministers Friday night picked Addis Ababa for the permanent headquarters of the Organization of African Unity (OAU).

The Ministers picked the Ethiopian capital over rival candidacies from Dakar, Lagos and Leopoldville in the course of a lengthy afternoon and night session in the Senegalese Foreign Ministry.

RUSK TO VISIT BONN ON WAY TO WASHINGTON

BONN, Aug. 10, (Reuter).—Mr. Dean Rusk the U.S. Secretary of State, will pay a flying visit here today which the West German Government hopes will help it to reach a decision about signing the nuclear test ban treaty.

On Thursday the West German Cabinet met to formulate their conditions for their accession to the treaty.

West Germany is still seeking assurances from Britain and the U.S. that East Germany will not be allowed to gain political prestige from her accession to the treaty.

But official attention here is now focussed more on the possible outcome of the talks between Mr. Rusk, Lord Home and Mr. Andrei Gromyko that followed the signing in Moscow of the test ban treaty.

Although the cabinet's view on this was not officially disclosed political sources said the overall German aim is to have a say in any future East-West agreement involving German interests before it is signed.

The U.S. and Britain initialled the test ban treaty with the Soviet Union before showing it to their NATO Allies, and the German view is that they overlooked essential German interests in drafting it.

Official sources yesterday gave this as the German view on any East-West agreements involving European security.

If any formal non-aggression pact is involved, it must be linked with tangible Soviet concessions on the German problem.

At the same time they chose Mr. Diallo Telli of Guinea as Secretary General of the OAU.

Mr. Telli has been representing the Conakry Government at the United Nations.

Addis Ababa was scene of the African summit conference last May which created the OAU for promotion of African unification.

In both cases choice of Addis Ababa and Mr. Telli, the ministers decision is subject to the approval of the Chiefs of State at their next meeting.

Earlier the ministers accepted Tunisia's proposal that this summit meeting be in Tunis, probably next May. In the interim there will be another conference of Foreign Ministers in February. The location of this ministerial meeting has not yet been determined.

Voice Of America Transmitter In Bombay

Issue Still Discussed

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10, (Reuter).—The State Department said yesterday the United States was still discussing with India the question of building a radio transmitter in that country for use by the Voice of America as well as the Indian broadcasting authorities.

"We hope we shall be able to work this matter out in a mutually satisfactory manner," a Department spokesman said.

The United States and India earlier agreed on the construction of the transmitter, but the Indian Government has since expressed doubts about the Voice of America using it since this might affect India's policy of non-alignment.

China And Somali Sign Technical Co-operation Pact

TOKYO, Aug. 10, (AP).—The Peoples Republic of China and the African Republic of Somali signed an economic and technical co-operation agreement in Peking Friday, the new China News Agency reported.

NCNA said the agreement was signed by Somali Prime Minister Abdirashid Ali Shermarke and Chinese Premier Chou en-Lai.

Earlier Friday, the Somali Prime Minister and his party had a friendly talk with Chairman Mao Tse-Tung of China, it added.

Later in the Evening, Premier Chou en-Lai said at a reception the Somali Prime Minister had "cordial talks" with the chairman Mao and President Liu Shao-Chi and other Chinese leaders in Peking, NCNA reported.

Chinese Vice-Chairman Of Council For World Trade Dies

PEKING, Aug. 10, (Reuter).—Chi Chao-Ting, Vice-Chairman of the China Council for the Promotion of International Trade, died of a cerebral haemorrhage here today, the New China News Agency reported. He was 60.

Mr. Chi was also Vice-President of the China-Latin American Friendship Association and a committee member of the Chinese People's Association for Cultural Relations with Foreign Countries.
