HONORS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

- Director of the School of Criminology and Criminal Justice, Gaylene Armstrong is the Terrorism Prevention Research Theme lead for the National Counterterrorism Innovation, Technology and Education Center of Excellence, a \$36.5 million, 10-year grant awarded from the Department of Homeland Security.

COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP

The School of Criminology and Criminal Justice has partnered with Nebraska State Probation to develop a Select Internship Program which will offer a stipend to students in participating UNO SCCJ Internship Program. Select students at both the bachelors and master's level, who meet specific criteria will be chosen for the pilot program in development between UNO SCCJ and Nebraska State Probation. This program will be a win-win for both the student and this potential employer. We know students who complete internships have an advantage of the critical knowledge of the position and role and the prospective employer gains insight into the candidate skills and competency.

UNO, PROJECT HARMONY GRANT PUTS FOCUS ON CHILD ADVOCACY

A new Omaha effort could help child advocacy centers across the nation improve child abuse investigations, reduce distress to children, and increase prosecutions.

The University of Nebraska at Omaha (UNO) has partnered with Project Harmony - one of the nation's largest child advocacy centers - to examine the implementation, processes, and evaluability of core services. The two-year project began in January and is funded by a roughly \$566,000 grant from the National Institute of Justice.

Teresa Kulig, Ph.D., Assistant Professor in the School of Criminology and Criminal Justice, is the lead investigator on the grant. She said the goal of the collaboration is to examine Project Harmony's core services - to obtain a baseline read on the feasibility of evaluating those services.

*The number of child advocacy centers has grown significantly over the last three decades and speaking generally, we just don't know scientifically which of their services are most important to achieving results for victimized children, families, and prosecutors," Kulig said. "This collaboration is an important first step that could help us lay the foundation for future outcome evaluation efforts."

She further noted that this project would not be possible without the efforts of the team involved, including Emily Wright, Ph.D. (Professor, School of Criminology and Criminal Justice at UNO), Ryan Spohn, Ph.D. (Director, Nebraska Center for Justice Research at UNO), Debra Anderson, Ph.D. (Deputy Director, Project Harmony), and the Data/Research Team at Project Harmony.

"Our ability to come together for a project of this magnitude

really speaks to the trust that community partners like Project Harmony place in the faculty and staff in the School and in the Center at UNO," she said.

The evaluation focuses on five core services within Project Harmony:

Forensic interviews: structured developmentally-appropriate conversations about a possible event a child may have witnessed or experienced.

Advocacy: support and referral assistance to a child and caregiver throughout investigation and prosecution of a case. Medical care: care and examination for signs of child abuse and neglect.

Mental health services: therapy that includes crisis counseling as an initial response to trauma.

Multidisciplinary teams: teams that work with law enforcement, social workers, and others to share information, plan treatment, and identify service/resource needs.

Gene Klein, Executive Director at Project Harmony, said the evaluation will help Project Harmony improve its impact and also benefit other child advocacy centers across the country.

Project Harmony is honored to have been selected with UNO by the National Institute of Justice for this important evaluation. We believe the results will tremendously influence the benefits of using a child advocacy center model to serve children and families impacted by child abuse and neglect.

The new collaboration is a continuation of a strong relationship between Project Harmony and UNO. For example, UNO theatre


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faculty and students have helped develop a revolving stage for use in training. Project Harmony is also a partner on the Child Welfare Cohort, a collaboration with UNO's Grace Abbott School of Social Work that helps employees earn degrees while continuing to work full time

JUVENILE JUSTICE INSTITUTE

The Juvenile Justice Institute (JJI) evaluates programs across the state of Nebraska. In the past fiscal year, we have provided technical assistance to 218 programs from Omaha to Scottsbluff. This contract is entitled "Evidence-based Nebraska," and is crucial to improving services in Nebraska.



Since 2012, over 200 students have participated in this service-learning course. In addition, there are now three additional universities participating in this service-learning initiative (all schools of the University of Nebraska campuses, plus Wesleyan and Doane Universities).

JJI Evaluations

The JJI has helped multiple communities across Nebraska learn how to take evaluation and research and translate it into practice. We also help programs with data collection through the Juvenile Case Management System (JCMS), which we use to track youth to see how effective programs are at preventing youth from recidivating. The JJI has published multiple reports, briefs, and evaluations about the efficacy of programs to provide youth with the support and skills they need to grow.


FRESHMAN/SOPHOMORE RETENTION RATE

UNO SENIOR HELPS RESTORE FLOOD-RAVAGED FAIRGROUNDS Brandon Bartling, University Communications

Alyssa Spartz is a fifth-year senior at UNO, double-majoring in Emergency Management and Psychology with concentrations in Public Health and Nonprofit Management and a minor in Sociology.

Communities like Arlington were tasked with cleaning up what floodwaters left behind after swollen rivers submerged a massive chunk of eastern Nebraska.

The Washington County Fairgrounds in Arlington are located only about half a mile from the Elkhorn River, which experienced record flooding in March 2019. As a result, fairground buildings, 4-H club offices and facilities, food stands, and arenas were left under about four feet of water and sewage.

Alyssa Spartz is a fifth-year senior at the University of Nebraska at Omaha (UNO) double-majoring in Emergency Management and Psychology with concentrations in Public Health and

Nonprofit Management and a minor in Sociology.

When the University of Nebraska put out a call searching for students to assist in flood recovery efforts, Spartz didn't hesitate

"When I first heard about the flood serviceship program, I was interested in it from an emergency management major perspective, but also because I wanted the chance to help out local Nebraska communities after the flooding," she said.

The Honors Program student has joined fair workers and other volunteers in power-washing, sanding, and painting the fairgrounds to have the facilities in top-notch shape by the time the Washington County Fair kicks off on Friday, July 26.

"It's been hot and hard labor, but definitely something that I would do again."

LUTTE NAMED TO FAA WOMEN IN AVIATION ADVISORY BOARD

Becky Lutte, PhD, associate professor within the Aviation Institute at UNO, is among 30 industry professionals and experts named by U.S. Secretary of Transportation Elaine L. Chao to the newly formed Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Women in Aviation Advisory Board (WIAAB).

The board was established by the FAA in October 2019 to develop strategies and recommendations to encourage women and girls to enter the field of aviation.

Lutte was chosen from a pool of nearly 200 applicants to join the board alongside aviation professionals and executives from major airlines and aerospace companies, nonprofit organizations within the aviation industry, aviation and engineering business associations, the U.S. Air Force Auxiliary, Civil Air Patrol, aviation trade schools, and other institutions of higher education.

John Bartle, PhD, Dean of the College of Public Affairs and Community Service, said her selection speaks to her experience and leadership in the field. "Becky Lutte has established herself as a national leader in the issues affecting women in the aviation industry," he said. "While it is an honor for her to be named to this board, I have no doubt that her service to our nation will be greater. This Board is poised to open the industry up to women and transform it forever."

UNO Aviation Institute Director Scott Tarry, PhD, said the honor was well-earned. "Becky Lutte has long been recognized for her leadership and advocacy for expanding the number of women working at all levels of the aviation industry. It is truly remarkable, yet not entirely surprising, that she would be called upon to be a voice for women in the industry at the national level. All of us at UNO's Aviation Institute are proud to have one of our own working side-by-side with many of the top women in aviation today."

"Women are underrepresented in many fields in aviation, with the greatest gaps in operations areas such as pilots and maintenance technicians," she said. "While there has been some improvement, the overall numbers have remained relatively stagnant and we can do better. We can build on the existing programs and efforts and explore new ways of looking at outreach and recruitment of women to share the exciting opportunities for women in aviation."

UNO one of just four schools selected for new Destination 225° university pathways.

On Thursday, Aug. 1, Southwest Airlines launched a new career program in partnership with Jet Linx Aviation and the University of Nebraska at Omaha (UNO), along with three other universities and five industry partners.

The Destination 225° program provides pathways for students in collegiate aviation programs to become competitively qualified candidates for future Southwest First Officer positions. On a compass, 225° is the southwest directional heading, and Destination 225° was developed to lead aspiring pilots to Southwest Airlines.

The pathway will put participating UNO Aviation Institute students on a career pathway that begins at Jet Linx or any of the other Destination 225° partners, including CAE, Bell Murray Aviation, US Aviation, XOJET Aviation and Swift Air. University partners include UNO, Arizona State University, Southeastern Oklahoma State University and University of Oklahoma.

Future aviators who apply, interview, and are selected for the Destination 225⁵ program will receive a Southwest mentor during their years of training, be invited to Southwest for training activities and events, and ultimately apply for selection as a Southwest Airlines First Officer. Participants will go through comprehensive training and a continuous evaluation process that will allow them to meet or potentially exceed Southwest's competitive hiring qualifications while preparing to be safe and efficient pilots who fly "the Southwest Way." There is no cost to apply to the program; however, candidates advancing through the selection process will be responsible for all costs incurred for their respective training programs. "Destination 225° will allow us to develop world-class pilots who are ready to fly The Southwest Way." said Alan Kasher, Southwest's Vice President of Flight Operations. "This comprehensive pilot development mission is designed to make becoming a Southwest Pilot an attainable goal for passionate, qualified individuals."

"Students in our professional flight program are already benefiting from the increased demand for pilots, but Destination 225° and this exciting partnership offers a unique opportunity for our students," said UNO Aviation Institute Director Scott Tarry. "Maverick aviators accepted into Destination 225° will be on course to work with the nation's premier aviation companies as they train to become professional pilots and begin the pursuit of a career in aviation. We're excited to be a part of this program and can't wait to see our students take full advantage of this fantastic opportunity."

The UNO Aviation Institute offers students flight instruction and education in areas such as air traffic control, airport management, airline operations, aviation safety and security, as well as a new program in unmanned aircraft systems.

Through classroom instruction, numerous extracurricular activities, simulation, and flight hours, students develop the skills they need to be successful in the aviation industry. UNO's competitive student aviation team, the Flying Mavs, is one of the most successful in the country, with recent top 10 finishes in the National Intercollegiate Flying Association's annual Safety and Flight Evaluation Conference competition. Maverick students also won the Transportation Research Board's Airport Cooperative Research Program (ACRP) design competition for airport innovation.

NASA SPACE GRANT + EPSCOR

In FY19, the NASA Nebraska Space Grant Consortium awarded 66 fellowships and internships to 30 females and 36 males, 20 of whom are underrepresented minorities. Fellowships were awarded at each of our 11 academic affiliates across the State of Nebraska, with 12 being awarded to UNO students. Of the 66 awards, 5 were NASA internships and 2 were aerospace industry internships.

UNO faculty received 4 of the 16 awarded NASA Established Program to Stimulate Competitive Research (EPSCoR) Mini-Grants, 7 of the 21 Higher Education Mini-Grants, 1 Informal Education Mini-Grant, and 3 Teacher Training Mini-Grants. CPACS faculty member, Rebecca Lutte was the recipient of one of these minigrants to develop a Women in the Aviation Workforce Report with a goal of determining a baseline number of women in a variety of fields in the aerospace industry to allow for the identification of areas in the industry that are underrepresented.

Two new academic courses at UNO were also supported: a Physics course focused on adapting NASA curricular materials to support new Nebraska standards in Physics Education, and a Science Methods and Design class in Teacher Education focusing on the design and experimentation of high-altitude ballooning.

Diversity continues to be a priority for the NASA Nebraska Space Grant. Our target for underrepresented students was 16.7% and we achieved 19.0% underrepresented direct participants. Our target for female participants was 40% and we achieved 47.0% female direct participants.

The Nebraska Space Grant supported more than 24 teacher training workshops to disseminate aerospace education content and curriculum across the state. These were primarily delivered by members of the Nebraska Space Ambassadors. We engaged 4,329 students throughout all of our programs, with our informal education programs reaching over 88 K-12 teachers, 86 informal educators, and 998 parents and members of the public at large.

ONLINE MASTER OF SOCIAL WORK (MSW) PROGRAM

In the Spring 2019 semester, the Grace Abbott School of Social Work (GASSW) began the admissions process for the online Master of Social Work (MSW) program which began in Fall 2019. Twenty-two students were admitted to the program, along with two University of Nebraska at Kearney (UNK) students merged into the cohort. The program began with strictly MSW foundation students in Fall 2019 and will start admitting advanced students in the coming semesters. Students in the online MSW program have started practicum placements in Colorado Springs, Des Moines, and Arkansas in several areas such as foster care, running trauma and social skills groups, and women's empowerment. Admissions applications for the upcoming academic year have exceeded expectations with online MSW applications making up 22% of total MSW applications.

GASSW had its largest practicum fair ever in Spring 2020 with 64 agencies, 108 representatives, and 150 students in attendance.



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SOCIAL WORK STUDENT, PROFESSOR EARN FULBRIGHT AWARDS

A student and faculty member from UNO's Grace Abbatt School of Social Work have been named recipients of prestigious Fulbright awards that will allow them to pursue their passions for helping others and build a shared, global focus on health and wellness.

Dalton Meister, a junior social work major, and Peter Szto, Ph.D., a professor of social work, were awarded funding to conduct international research with ties to China. Despite COVID-19 putting a hold on international travel for the immediate future, both are looking forward to the opportunities and resources that come with being a Fulbright Scholar.

"With faculty like Peter, whose work has brought new dimensions to global social work to expand our understanding of mental health, and students like Dalton, who take every opportunity to enhance their undergraduate experience, it is clear why such a well-known, global organization like the Fulbright Program would select these two excellent representatives of UNO's social work program," Amanda Randall, Ph.D., professor and director of the Grace Abbott School of Social Work, said.

Dalton Meister (pictured on left) Meister, who has minors in medical humanities; human rights studies; holocaust and genocide studies; and international studies, as well as serving as a senator for UNO Student Government, earned one of the first Canada-Mitacs Globalink Research Internships for his Fulbright.

The award supports researchers from British Columbia who are developing a resource map of schools and locations in Hong Kong that provide social work education and support. It's a cause that spoke to Meister personally.



"As a student at UNO, I've had the opportunity to participate in a wonderful social work program that takes students abroad to China and using photography as a means for social change," he explained. "Having previous experiences with Hong Kong, I thought [this project] would be a wonderful way to reconnect with those experiences."

Meister credits his faculty mentors in the Grace Abbott School of Social Work and the Office of National Scholarships and Fellowships with his success in achieving the scholarship.

"For each and every part of my education and my scholarship, they've mentored me, they've guided me and I wouldn't be the person I am today or have as rich of an education as I've had without all their guidance."

It is precisely because of the global impacts of illnesses like COVID-19 that he knows a global perspective of social work is key.

While his specific project is currently on hold due to restrictions tied to the pandemic, Meister said that he still plans to collaborate with faculty on the project in some way and hopefully pursue the project in earnest next summer.

Peter Szto (pictured on right)

Szto was recently named the recipient of a Fulbright Distinguished Chair in the Social Sciences. The award will take him to China to develop a social work curriculum a facused on an indigenous-based mental health.

While the exact schedule of his time in China is on hold due to COVID-19, Szto will spent approximately 10 months in a country in need of mental health support.

"The central government understands that social work is a strategic solution to address citizens' mental health needs," he said. "What's missing is a model of care and curriculum to train a mental health work force,"

Szto, who himself is the son of Chinese immigrants, has spent much of his academic career focused on social welfare development in China, including mass internal migrations from rural to urban spaces and the stigma around mental illness.

"The topic of mental health is pretty much cloaked in stigma and taboo, and thus, under-developed from a service delivery and educational perspective," he said. "An indigenous approach is appropriate to avoid problems associated with Western imperialism or colonialism."

Szto said that being chosen as a recipient for a Fulbright award is a "deep honor" and that he hopes " to make a significant contribution to China in terms of social work education and mental health."

The Fulbright Program is the flagship international educational exchange program sponsored by the U.S. government and is designed to increase mutual understanding between the people of the United States and the people of other countries.

Recipients of Fulbright grants are selected on the basis of academic or professional achievement, as well as demonstrated leadership potential in their fields. The program operates in over 160 countries worldwide. Since its inception in 1946, the Fulbright Program has provided more than 380,000 participants—chosen for their academic merit and leadership potential — with the opportunity to exchange ideas and contribute to finding solutions to shared international concerns.

CPACS' William Brennan Institute for Labor Studies has, since its inception in 1980, been the premier resource for "all things union" in the State of Nebraska.

System

In 1980, a new public service outreach program was established at the University of Nebraska at Omaha. The William Brennan Institute for Labor Studies was created with a statewide mission "to foster critical and creative thinking among labor leaders, potential leaders, and interested members by providing relevant information and training in the skills necessary for success in today's economy and workplace."



The Institute acts as a bridge extending the resources of the university to the broader Nebraska community thereby making its resources more readily available to Nebraskans and their labor organizations.

The Institute's primary audience is the women and men of Nebraska's labor movement. Over time, a

secondary audience emerged. As a result the Institute also does programming aimed at educating Nebraskans about the role organized labor did to create an economy where the American Dream is available to those, who work hard and play by the rules.

To accomplish its mandate, the Institute provides universityquality programs of teaching, research, and community service for labor organizations at the local, state, regional, and national levels, as well as educational offerings to expand public awareness about why organized labor exists, what it exists to accomplish, and what tools it uses to put the American Dream within reach of everyday wage earners. Classes and other educational offerings take place off- and on-campus.

The Institute is a member of the United Association for Labor Education (UALE), and is one of about 20 such university-based labor education programs around the county. To become a member of UALE, each university-based program must have its own budget, a full time director, and a Labor Advisory Committee (LAC).

The purpose of the LAC is to assist in the formulation and e evaluation of broad program policy. More specifically, the with members' duty is to interpret the educational needs of the labor ng movement; review and evaluate programs and proposals for projects; promote the Institute's programming within the labor in the

labor; and support labor education within the University

WHAT WILL THE FUTURE HOLD FOR THE INSTITUTE AND OTHER PUBLIC OUTREACH PROGRAMS?

The Institute has partnered with the relatively new Nebraska Center for Workforce Development & Education (NCWDE), to get programming to "new" audiences like high school students and previously incarcerated people to learn about what careers are available to them in the building and construction trades. Additionally the NCWDE has begun to record labor education programming digitally. Currently there are two programs that are in their "beta" versions and more recordings are being planned.
