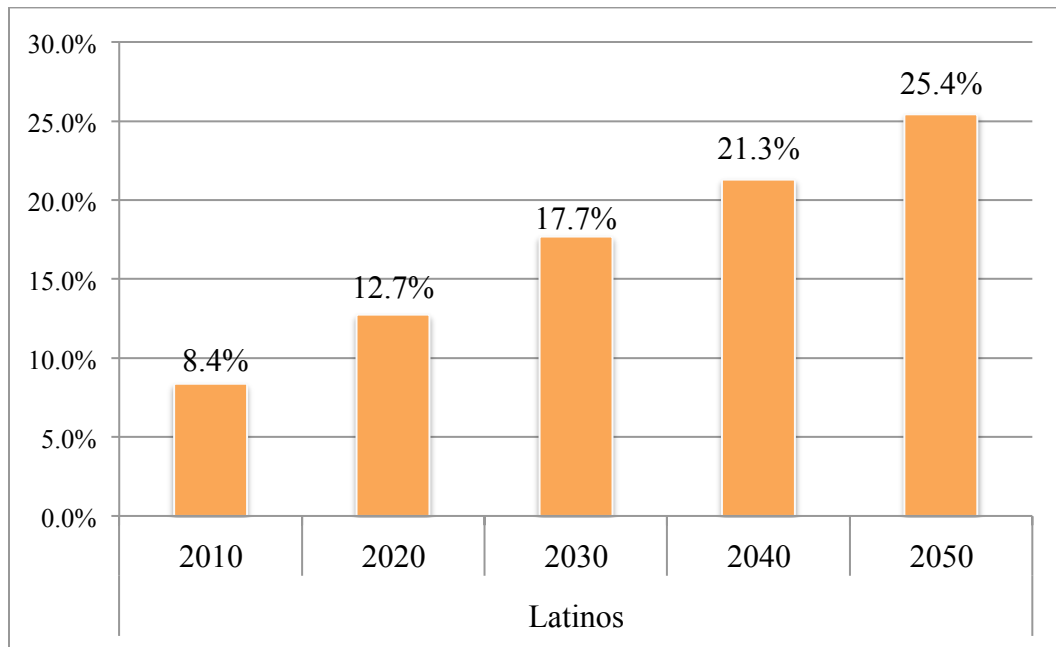

**Figure 1. Percentage of Nebraska's Workforce who are Latinos, Actual and Projected: 2010-2050**



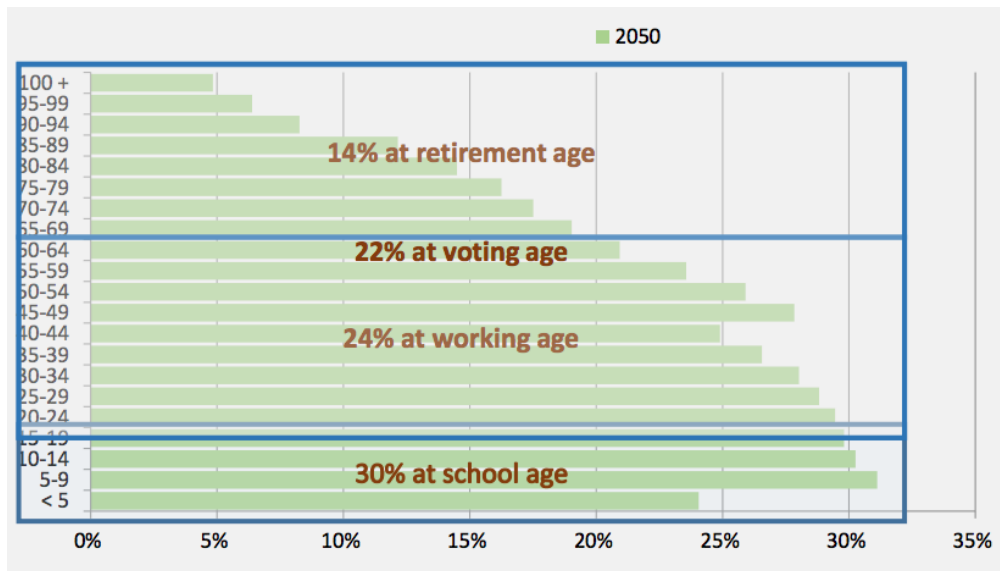
