A Proud Tradition

Founded in 1908 as the University of Omaha, the University of Nebraska at Omaha has evolved into a comprehensive public university that has received national and international recognition for some of its specialties. The University offers excellent academic programs, a lively intellectual and cultural atmosphere and a friendly campus.

The University of Nebraska at Omaha is a state-assisted university located in the heart of Nebraska's largest city. First established as a private nonsectarian college, the University's steady growth through the years eventually brought about its affiliation in the mid-1960s with the University of Nebraska. The merger created the University of Nebraska system, which includes the University of Nebraska at Omaha, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and the University of Nebraska Medical Center in Omaha.

One of the basic ideas for our University, one in which we take great pride, is a dedication to the liberal arts. We believe an educated person needs to learn to correlate, to see the relationships among concepts and phenomena, and to have an understanding of several academic disciplines. To bring about this process of intellectual integration, we require each student to take courses selected from the humanities, the social sciences and the natural sciences.

Another of our basic ideas is dedication to quality education of students. Since more than 80 percent of the faculty members here hold the highest degree in their field of study, many freshmen are taught by full professors and not teaching assistants, even in introductory-level courses.

Our faculty members bring a broad range of research expertise and public service commitment to their classrooms. "Real world" savvy is a strength of our faculty. Both faculty members and graduate students assist small business around the state through the Nebraska Business Development Center and other programs offered through the College of Business Administration. The University's Center for Public Affairs Research, a program of the College of Public Affairs and Community Service, coordinates the efforts of faculty and students who conduct original research on public affairs issues confronting the citizens of Nebraska. Similar opportunities exist in the arts, education, social work and other professions.

ACADEMIC REGALIA

Identification of the hood and robe as academic apparel is believed to have originated at the English universities of Oxford and Cambridge during the twelfth and thirteenth centuries. The hoods are a carry-over from the times when monks, who operated these universities, wore them to protect their shaved heads in winter. The robe is an adaptation of the shoulder cape also worn by these same monks while collecting alms.

Use of the academic robe came to the United States in 1754 with the founding of what is now Columbia University. In 1895, a commission of University officials adopted a universal code of design and color for the academic garb. This code has undergone several revisions in subsequent years.

Styling of the robes varies for the bachelor's and master's degrees with the width of sleeve borders and length of the hood increasing with each advanced degree. Hoods are normally not used for bachelor's degrees today. Instead, the tassel colors are used to indicate the degree program.

CHANCELLOR'S MEDAL RECIPIENT

SONIA R. GREEN

Sonia R. Green, assistant director of the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation (HPER), has been a distinguished member of the University of Nebraska at Omaha community for more than twenty-five years.

After receiving her master's degree in counseling and guidance from Omaha University (now UNO) in 1965, she accepted a position as physical education instructor and basketball and softball coach at the University. She was named coordinator of the Physical Education Service Class Program and the HPER Student Teacher Program in 1975. In 1982 she was promoted to assistant director of the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

Prior to her position at UNO, Ms. Green served as a physical education teacher and counselor for the Omaha Public Schools and a physical education teacher for the Los Angeles Public Schools.

Ms. Green's dedication to the University of Nebraska at Omaha Faculty Senate has been long-standing. Throughout her career, she also has co-authored several publications, received numerous grants and has been active in community service. She was named a member of the External Team for the Omaha Public Schools evaluation for the North Central Accreditation Review in 1990. In 1984, she received the National Association for Sport and Physical Education "Inspiration Award."

For her commitment and service to the University of Nebraska at Omaha, it is with great pride that Sonia R. Green is recognized with the prestigious Chancellor's medal.

DAVID W. HINTON

David W. Hinton, Ph.D., is a highly respected member of the University of Nebraska at Omaha both as a faculty member and as an administrator.

Throughout his 19 years at the University, he has served as assistant director of the Center for Applied Urban Research, chairperson of the Urban Studies Department and the Department of Public Administration, and associate dean of the College of Public Affairs and Community Service. In 1985, Dr. Hinton was named professor and appointed dean of the College of Public Affairs and Community Service.

He received his bachelor's degree in business administration and sociology from Upper Iowa University in 1965, a master's degree in business administration from the University of Arkansas in 1967 and a Ph.D. in economics from the University of Arkansas in 1971. Prior to coming to UNO, he taught economics at the University of Tennessee at Martin.

Dr. Hinton has written numerous research papers and articles related to public affairs issues and has been involved extensively in university and community service. His community involvement has focused on non-profit agencies. Through his leadership, several million dollars have been generated in grants and contracts for the university and the community. In addition, he was instrumental in the development of the university's minority faculty development program. He currently teaches both undergraduate and graduate level courses including research methods and applied statistics in public administration.

For all of his accomplishments and contributions to the community and the University of Nebraska at Omaha, it is with great pleasure and respect that Dr. David Hinton is awarded the Chancellor's Medal.
