


Percent of the U.S. Total Population by Race and Ethnicity, 1960-2060


Projected Components of Change for Hispanic Origin Population, U.S.: 2015-2060


Percent of the Nebraska Total Population by Race and Ethnicity, 1980-2050




Age-Sex Pyramids for Latinos and Non-Hispanic Whites, Nebraska 2012


More visible growth from the youngest age-groups





Foreign Born Latinos

Median age: 34

50% Speaks English well or very well

67% of adults 25 years and older have <u>less</u> than high school diploma




U.S Born Latinos

Median age: 13


Half speak only English. 93% of those who are bilingual speak English well or very well

81% of adults 25 years and older have either completed high school or post-secondary degree

Wait, there are Intergenerational ties!



Hispanic Immigrant wages taking harder to recover from pre-recession



Nebraska

Manufacturing

- Employs 30% of the total immigrant Latinos, pays on avg. \$25,256 a year
- Employs 10% of total non-Immigrant Latinos, pays on avg. \$26,477 a year





- Employs 15% of the total immigrant Latinos, pays on avg. \$24,507 a year
- Employs 6% of the total non-immigrant Latinos, pays on avg. \$25,672 a year

Accommodation and Food Services

- Employs 10% of total immigrant Latinos, pays on avg. \$ 15,440 a year
- Employs 11% of total non-immigrant Latinos , pays on avg. \$ 11,202 a year

Waste Management

- Employs 7% total immigrant Latinos, pays on avg. \$22,975 a year
- Employs 5% total non-immigrant Latinos, pays on avg. \$29,930 a year




Health Care and Social Assistance


- Employs 4% of total immigrant Latinos, pays on avg. \$21,520 a year


Strong growth in Latino Business



... but with a lot of challenges








Latinos Are Much Less Likely to Drop out of High School than Before

Latino High School Dropout Rate by Nativity, Nebraska 2000-2012




Latino High School Dropouts by Nativity, Nebraska 2000-2012
