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

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The primary purposes of the University of Nebraska at Omaha are, first, to maintain a faculty of dynamic teacher-scholars of high character and competence who will inspire able and willing students to achieve to the maximum of their abilities and, second, to provide classroom, laboratory, and library facilities adequately equipped to produce an environment conducive to learning of the highest order.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

With a student body of approximately 16,900, the University of Nebraska at Omaha strives to treat each student as an individual, giving attention to the student's background, problems, and aspirations. Ample opportunity is provided for specialized study in terms of interest, talent, and ultimate vocational objective. Thus, the University is concerned that its graduates be good citizens who earn a better living and live a richer, fuller life.

The University of Nebraska at Omaha is one of the four campuses of the University of Nebraska system. The other three campuses are the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, the University of Nebraska Medical Center, and the University of Nebraska at Kearney.

The University of Nebraska at Omaha is the administrative home of six colleges: Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Continuing Studies, Education, Fine Arts, and Public Affairs and Community Service. In addition, three colleges administered by the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, (Agriculture, Engineering & Technology and Home Economics) have a substantial in-resident program on the campus. Finally, at UNO there is a full range of graduate programs under the administrative aegis of the University-wide Graduate College.

The University, in addition to offering courses for college credit, designs training courses for thousands of business and industrial employees; provides in-service training for elementary and secondary school teachers; conducts television classes for college credit on both commercial television and its own educational channel (KYNE-TV); and sponsors a wide variety of conferences, workshops, lectures, and fine art events to enrich the college credit offerings.

The University of Nebraska at Omaha is a commuter campus, and has no on-campus housing for students.

HISTORY

What is now the University of Nebraska at Omaha was founded in 1908 as the University of Omaha, a private non-sectarian college, with a campus at 24th and Pratt Streets in northeast Omaha. The first term of the coeducational college began in 1909, under the leadership of Dr. Daniel E. Jenkins, with twenty students. The movement to make the University a municipal institution began in 1929, and in May, 1930 the citizens of Omaha voted to establish the Municipal University of Omaha. In the summer of 1930, the Omaha Board of Education selected the first University Board of Regents who were inducted into office on July 1, 1930. In January, 1931 the new Board of Regents took over the University of Omaha and its properties.

The expansion of the Municipal University of Omaha in the early 1930's led to a decision to move the campus to a 52-acre site southwest of Dodge and 60th Streets. In November 1936, the University secured a grant from the Works Progress Administration which, together with some accrued building funds, financed the construction of a Georgian-style building. This building, now called Arts and Sciences Hall, was finished in 1938 and served as the sole campus building until the 1950's.

In July 1968, the citizens of Omaha voted to transfer all University property to the University of Nebraska, and the former Municipal University of Omaha became the University of Nebraska at Omaha.

The University began rapid growth when it became a part of the University of Nebraska System. Enrollment was 8,730 in Fall, 1967 which was the last year as the Municipal University of Omaha. Three years later, enrollment was 13,185, a growth of 51 percent in the first three years as the University of Nebraska at Omaha. By Fall, 1991, enrollment had reached 16,835.

The Dodge Street campus has expanded from its original 52 acres to the current 88.5 acres. Recent new structures on the Dodge Street campus are the Durham Science Center and the Henningson Memorial Campanile, a bell tower rising nearly one hundred seventy feet. The Peter Kiewit Conference Center was opened recently in downtown Omaha.

The University of Nebraska at Omaha is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, and has programs which are accredited or approved by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, the National Council on Social Work Education, the Engineers Council for Professional Development, Technology Accreditation Commission/Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology, National Association for Industrial Technology, the American Home Economics Association (for undergraduate programs), the American Dietetic Association, the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business, the National Association of School of Music, the National Association of Schools of Public Affairs and Administration, the Educational Standards Board of Examiners in Speech-Language Board of the Pathology and Park Association/American Audiology, the National Recreation and Association for Leisure and Recreation and the American Chemical Society.

Course credits from the University of Nebraska at Omaha are accepted by other colleges and universities which are members of the North Central Association and by other regional accrediting agencies.





University of Nebraska at Omaha Administrative Site Headcount Enrollment Fall Semesters: 1982 Through 1991






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University of Nebraska at Omaha Sources of Change, Total "On-Campus" Enrollment; Fall 1990 to Fall 1991






Students Taking Only CCS Courses



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University of Nebraska at Omaha Total "On-Campus" Headcount Enrollment Fall Semesters: 1972 Through 1991









University of Nebraska at Omaha Age Distribution of "On-Campus" Undergraduate and Graduate Students; By Sex: Fall 1991






University of Nebraska at Omaha Percent of "On-Campus" Undergraduate Students: By Sex: Selected Fall Semesters: 1973 - 1991







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





"On-Campus" Undergraduate Student Body By Status: Fall 1991












University of Nebraska at Omaha Rank Distribution of the Full-Time UNO Faculty: 1970-71, 1981-82 and 1991-92







University of Nebraska at Omaha Distribution of Current Revenues For the Year Ended June 30, 1991








University of Nebraska at Omaha Percent Growth; Educational & General Expenditure & Revenue: 1980-81 - 1990-91







Library



UNIVERSITY LIBRARY General Information

The University Library offers many services to its users and contains materials and facilities for study and research. The collection includes over 642,000 volumes, more than 1,300,000 microforms items, and 7,000 pieces of audio-visual material. The total number of serials subscribed to is over 4,300, including almost 200 newspapers from around the world. As a government document depository, the University Library collects most federal and Nebraska state publications and also has documents from some other states and from the United Nations. Nearly all of the Library's collection is on open shelves and is arranged according to the Library of Congress classification system. The holdings of the Library are available on-line through UNO's General Information System (GENISYS). GENISYS is available through terminals in the library, via Ethernet, and by modem from remote locations.





NON-CREDIT PROGRAMS

College of Continuing Studies

The college of Continuing Studies (CCS) at UNO offers both credits and non-credit activities for persons wishing to continue their education. The College offers an extensive schedule of evening, summer, and offcampus credit classes for those who must work, but wish to pursue a college degree. CCS offers the Bachelor of General Studies degree, as well as non-credit programs and courses for those who have special interests. Conferences and institutes are offered, serving local and national professional groups and associations, and business, academic, and community needs.

Center for Public Affairs Research

The Center for Public Affairs Research provides applied research and technical assistance to private, governmental, and not-for-profit organizations throughout Nebraska. The Center is an important vehicle for promoting interdisciplinary research and technical assistance on social, political, and economic issues, and on public policy strategies.

The Center publishes various monographs including the annual <u>Nebraska</u> <u>Policy Choices</u>. Center staff also present annually the Urban Conditions Research Program and participate in the Legislative Issues Symposium.

Nebraska Business Development Center

The Nebraska Business Development Center (NBDC) was founded in 1977 as one of eight pilot centers, known then as the University Business Development Centers. Since 1978, NBDC basic service centers have been established at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, Kearney State College, Wayne State College, Chadron State College, Peru State College, Mid-Plains Community College in North Platte, and in Scottsbluff. The statewide coordination is provided through the Omaha center, located in UNO's College of Business Administration.

NBDC delivers management and technical assistance through its own staff, faculty of its member institutions, faculty of other colleges in the state, and through consultants from the private sector. NBDC's consulting services have focused on marketing management and financial management. There also has been substantial demand for marketing research and financial forecasting. Through its workshops and seminars, NBDC provides the Nebraska business community continuing education in business management. The program for workshops and seminars is managed from the Omaha NBDC office.

In addition to its consultation and training programs, NBDC maintains support services for the benefit of both small business owners and their employees and advisers. These include:

- <u>NBDC Report</u>, which is a management brief published monthly and distributed to more than 20,000 business owners and managers in Nebraska.
- A comprehensive small business library maintained at the NBDC office in Omaha.
- The NBDC Microcomputer Training Center teaches the use of personal computers to solve business problems. Classes are available to businesses of all sizes. A fee is charged.
- 4. <u>Nebraska Business</u> <u>Calendar</u> is published annually and includes federal and state tax due dates as well as other useful information.
- 5. Specialized financial consulting assistance, including packaging of SBA loans and valuation appraisal of closely held businesses.

The Nebraska Business Development Center houses the membership services office for the national Association of Small Business Development Centers. It has also received national recognition for its programs in rural business development and women business ownership.

In 1991, NBDC provided in-depth assistance to 377 small businesses and short-term assistance to 1,927 businesses. It also conducted 72 workshops with 1,528 participants. These services were provided to businesses from 257 Nebraska towns.

International Center for Telecommunications Management

The International Center for Telecommunications Management was established in 1989 to serve as a comprehensive university-based research, information, and service center contributing to the strategic success of the telecommunications industry, domestic and world-wide. The Center operates as a unit of the College of Business Administration, and is funded by joint participation of the telecommunications industry and the State of Nebraska.

The Center is organized into three interactive functions: (1) Research, (2) Information Services, and (3) Instruction. The Research function extends to administrative and managerial tasks, technology assessment, systems design, and marketing. Information Services provides information to the industry in various media, and presents an annual conference. The Instruction function offers credit and non-credit courses.
