1970 FIRST COUNT CENSUS DATA:
POPULATION AND HOUSING CHARACTERISTICS
FOR DOUGLAS COUNTY, NEBRASKA*

Changes in Omaha population from 1960 to 1970 have been more areal than real. While significant spatial changes of population may be noted, the rate of population growth during the decade can only be described as moderate. This is a conclusion from initial output from the U.S. Bureau of the Census' 1970 First Count computer tapes.

The census computer tapes provide population and housing data in more detail and in finer geographic areas than the traditional printed reports. In addition, since they are the medium through which the printed reports are generated, they provide valuable advance data to census users.

Advantages of First Count Data

This report presents a brief summary of First Count census data for Douglas County, Nebraska. It has been aggregated into the 95 census tracts of the county from block group and enumeration district data in File A of the Nebraska First Count tape. Data, therefore, are available for smaller geographic areas than the census tract.¹

¹The Bureau of the Census defines a block group (BG) as a combination of continuous blocks having a combined average population of about 1,000. It is used in census-by-mail areas where Address Coding Guides have been prepared. Enumeration districts (ED) are small population areas averaging about 250 housing units. They are used for the collection and tabulation of population and housing census data for the conventional enumeration areas not covered by the Address Coding Guide. There are approximately 400 BGs and EDs in Douglas County. BG and ED data will not be available in published form.

Block groups and enumeration districts provide an interesting "middle scale" for urban analysis. Since they are smaller than a census tract and larger than a census block, they can better approximate a neighborhood unit. Social and economic information not available at the census block level will be available at this scale. Furthermore, the Bureau of the Census intends to issue a computer tape with BG and ED centroids in association with its GRIDS program to facilitate computer mapping of First Count data.²

Disadvantages of First Count Data

Unless errors are discovered by the Bureau of the Census in preparing its future published reports, the First Count data presented herein will become final. Data are not expected to change significantly since all totals on the computer tape agree with the printed advance reports. There are, however, subtle problems with the First Count format which may make population and housing data vary slightly. Such variation is not expected to be more than one or two units.

Study of the File A tape yields numerous indications of data suppression. Population and housing characteristics are not tabulated for those "imaginary" BGs and EDs which contain fewer than five persons and five housing units. In all cases, population and housing units can be allocated, but a small degree of human bias is necessarily built in. In addition, several non-mappable EDs occur in western Douglas County which will create problems in mapping.³

General Characteristics of 1970 Douglas County Population

The decade of the 1960s has witnessed significant shifts of population within Omaha and Douglas County. The construction of freeways has displaced thousands of persons, especially in South Omaha. The change in the industrial employment mix from a food products base to one of diversified industry has taken persons out of the urban core and placed new population in an outer zone. Urban sprawl has devoured formerly rural and agricultural land of the county, leaving a vacuum of lower population density within the central city. Moreover, the predominantly Black area has undergone substantial change.

Some generalizations from 1970 First Count data follow. Additional characteristics may be noted on Tables 1 and 2.

- ± Douglas County population increased from 343,490 to 389,455, or 13.4%.
- ± The white population increased from 317,026 to 352,281, or 11.1%.
- ± Whites comprised 90.5% of the county's population in 1970; in 1960 the figure was 92.3%.
- ± The Black population increased from 25,269 to 34,722, or 37.4%. Douglas County gained 25,802 more whites than Blacks.
- ± Blacks now comprise 8.9% of Douglas County compared to 7.4% in 1960.
- ± The American Indian population registered a 69.4% increase, or from 705 to 1,194.⁴

- ± American Indians make up 0.3% of the population of the county; in 1960 they were 0.2%.
- ± The number of persons per occupied housing unit was 3.18 in 1970 compared to 3.30 in 1960.
- ± Almost all census tracts had fewer persons per occupied housing unit in 1970 than in 1960, reflecting the trend toward multi-family housing and perhaps changes in fertility and mortality patterns.
- ± The variation in number of persons per occupied housing unit between north Omaha and west Omaha is not as great as previously estimated. Earlier estimates were based on preliminary data and considered total housing units, not total occupied housing units.⁵
- ± In 1970, 61.8% of Douglas County's housing units were owner occupied; in 1960 it was 62.6%.
- ± The county vacancy rate in 1970 was 5.6; in 1960 it was 4.8.
- ± In the inner city, 17 census tracts had vacancy rates in excess of 10.0 compared to 5 in 1960; 13 of the 17 were north of Dodge Street.

The Black Population

The spatial and temporal patterns exhibited by Black population have been of long-standing interest to this author. The same could be said of the Omaha ghetto. If a ghetto is described as a quarter of a city where minority group members are forced to live because of social, legal, and economic pressures, then the Omaha ghetto has not changed significantly in the past decade.⁶ Some general characteristics of Omaha Black population, from Bureau of the Census 1970 data, are:

- ± Less than one-half of 1% of the population west of 48th Street is Black.
- ± One Black in 35 lives west of 48th Street.

- ± In the 15 north Omaha census tracts which contain the greatest number of Blacks, the 1970 number of Black persons per occupied housing unit was 3.43; in 1960 the number of non-white persons per occupied housing unit was 3.69.⁷
- ± This area had 6,297 more Blacks than in 1960 (27.4% gain), but 19,133 fewer whites (56.1% loss).
- ± In these 15 tracts, 51.5% of housing units were owner occupied; in 1960 the comparable figure was 54.9%.
- ± This area had a 1970 residential vacancy rate of 11.6; in 1960 it was 3.5.

A similar type of analysis has been performed for the seven census tracts which, in this author's impression, constitute the Black core. These tracts cover an area from 16th Street to 30th Street, and from Cuming (900 North) to Lothrop Street (3200 North) and Bristol Street (3300 North).⁸

- ± There were 1,240 fewer housing units recorded in 1970 than 1960. In 1960 there were 6,305 units; in 1970 the Bureau of the Census counted 5,065 units.⁹
- ± In 1970, 42.2% of Black housing was owner occupied; in 1960 it was 46.0%.
- ± In 1970, 36.5% of white housing was owner occupied; in 1960 it was 26.8%.
- ± In 1970, the number of Black persons per occupied housing unit was 2.92; in 1960, the number of non-white persons per housing unit was 3.47.
- ± In 1970, the number of white persons per occupied housing unit was 2.44; in 1960 it was 3.06.
- ± This area had a 30.6% loss in Black population -- 15,292 to 10,618.
- ± This area had a 72.6% loss in white population -- 5,040 to 1,380.

± The residential vacancy rate in this area in 1970 was 15.4; in 1960 it was 4.1.

Cogitation

The U.S. Bureau of the Census has been accused of underenumeration in each of its population censuses. This problem is most acute in minority group, and particularly non-white, areas. The Census Bureau admits to enumeration errors in procedural reports, but local officials estimate this error much higher.¹⁰ Sources within the Omaha Black community propose a Black population in excess of 40,000, or at least 15% higher than 1970 census figures.¹¹

Although the Bureau of the Census has never officially recounted an area, and such a recount is unlikely in this case, a thorough review of census data is needed to arrive at rational conclusions. First Count data by block groups provides an initial medium for this type of investigation.¹²

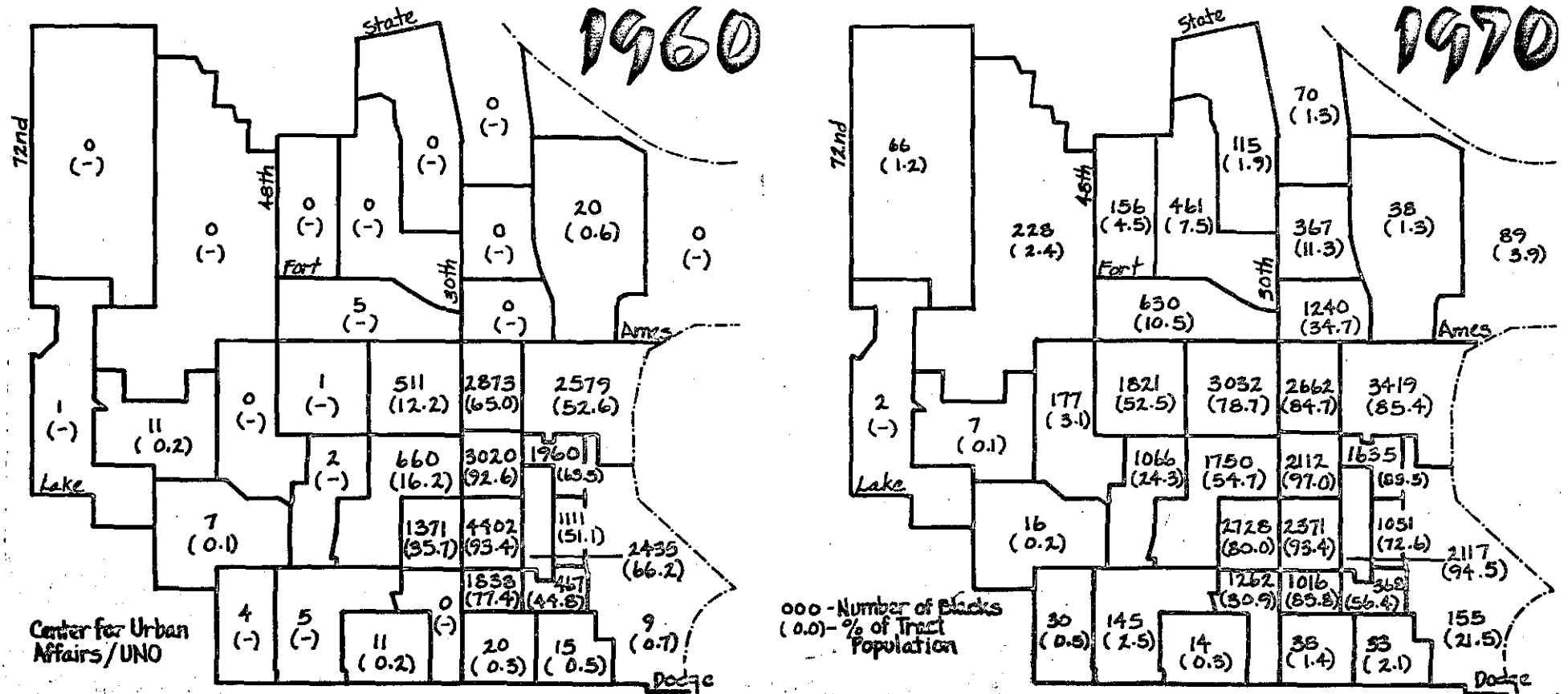

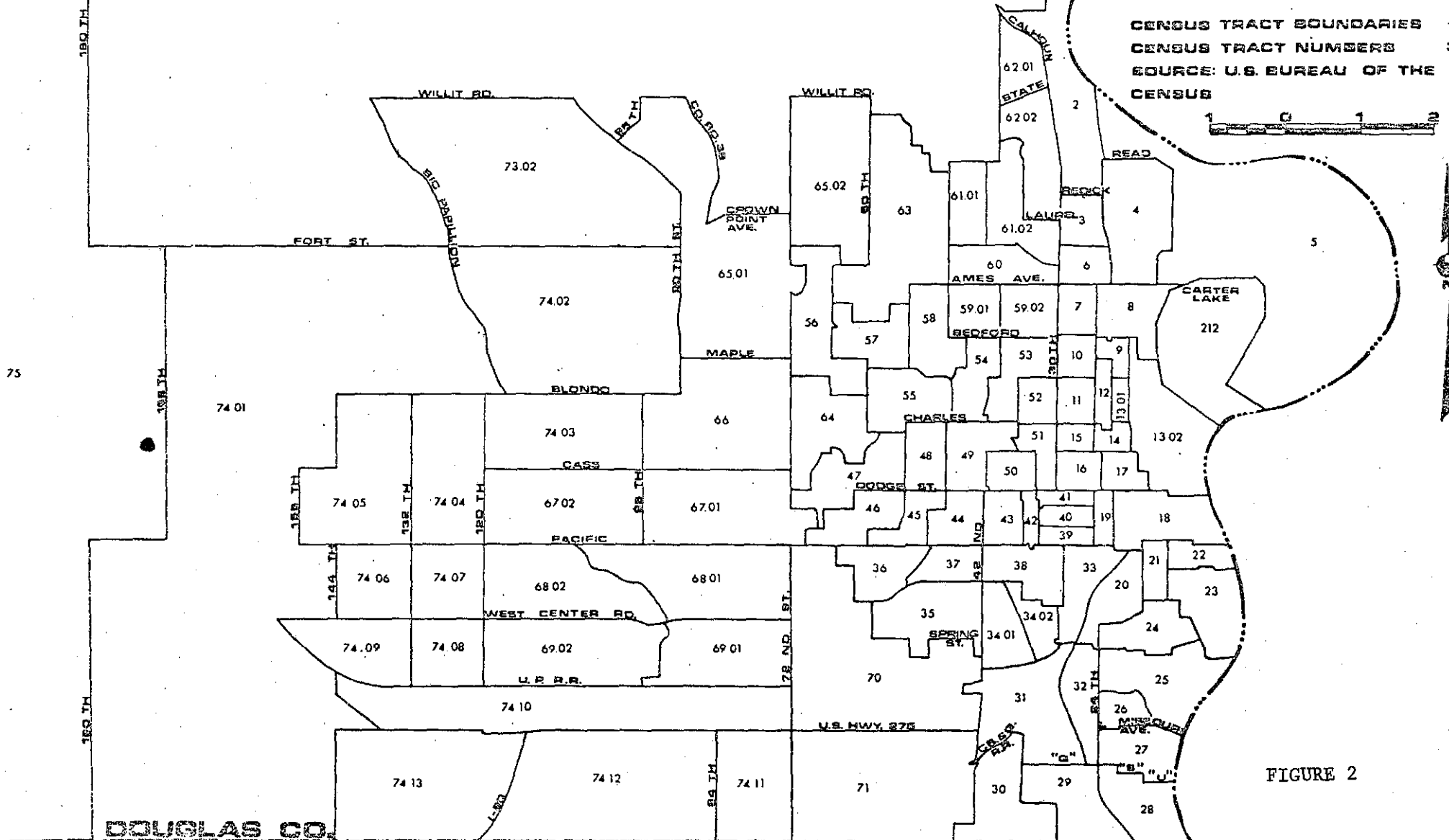
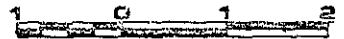
