

John Lyden

John Lyden became Editor of the *Journal* of *Religion and Film* in 2011. He is currently the Director of the Liberal Arts Core at Grand View University. Previously, he was professor and chair of the Religion Department at Dana College from 1991-2010. He is the author of *Film as Religion: Myths, Morals, and Rituals* (New York: NYU Press, 2003), is the editor of *Enduring Issues in Religion* (San Diego:

Greenhaven Press, 1995) and is also the editor of *The Routledge Companion to Religion and Film* (Routledge, 2009). He is currently editing (along with Eric Mazur) *The Routledge Companion to Religion and Popular Culture*.

He has published numerous articles on interreligious dialogue, religion and culture, and religion and film, which have appeared in edited volumes as well as journals such as the *Journal of Religion and Film, Dialogue and Alliance, Religion and Public Education,* and *The Journal of Ecumenical Studies*. In 2007, he was interviewed for and appeared in the History Channel documentary, *Star Wars: The Legacy Revealed*. Dr. Lyden has been co-chair of the Religion, Film, and Visual Culture Group of the American Academy of Religion since 2005.

He was the 2008 recipient of the Spiritus Award for Outstanding Contributions to the study of Religion and Film.

Tamara Feldman was born and raised in Haysville, Kansas. At the age of 17 she got a modeling contract in Asia and left to travel the world. After a year of travel, she settled in San Francisco where she started to work on acting. After being cast off the street for a commercial and with the encouragement from her acting teacher, she made the move to Los Angeles. Starting off with guest starring roles on shows such as Smallville, Monk, CSI, and many others it was only a matter of time before landing bigger roles on Gossip Girl and Dirty Sexy Money. In between roles on television she was lucky enough to land movies such as Perfect Stranger where she acted along side Bruce Willis and Halle Berry and Echelon Conspiracy with Shane West, Ed Burns, Martin Sheen, and Ving Rhames. She also won a best actress award from the Red Nations Film Awards for her role in the Native American movie Rez Bomb. While on set. Tamara learned how crews worked and became interested in directing. After writing a script that she believed in and with a lot of help from her friends, she was able to produce, direct, and act in her own short film entitled Resurrection Slope. She was lucky enough to get an amazing child actor named Elliott Moore and Oscar winner John Hawkes. She hopes this is the first of many endeavors in film making while she hones her craft and gets more comfortable on the other side of the camera.


